HARD FEDERAL **BLOW HITS SEARS-**ROEBUCK CONCERN

Federal Trade Commission's Complaint Specifies "False and Misleading Trade Practices."

Legal phraseology presumably has its ses—although it might be far beyond some fairly clear statements, which are very interesting and are printed below. Among other things, Sears, Roebuck & Co., are charged with issuing advertisements "offering" for sale to the general public sugar at prices from three to four cents per pound and that said advertisements are false

a price lower than others offering sugar for sale; whereas, in fact, respondent is selling said sugar at a loss, and its offer to so sell is limited to a definite quan-tity of sugar and is made and upon the express condition that certain specific amounts of other groceries be purchased therewith, for which respondent receives
