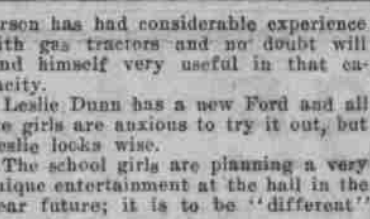

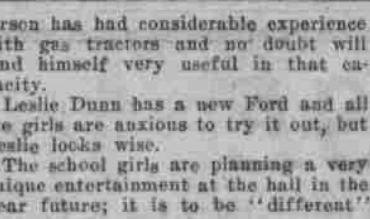
Mr. Ada Gardner of Salem is spending the week with her daughter, Mrs. E. A. Lewis.

Silverton, Ore., April 15.—Mrs. S. J. Comstock died suddenly at her home in this city yesterday afternoon from a heart attack. She was nearly 70 years of age. She arose early and prepared the morning meal, apparently in her usual health. Shortly after noon she was found by one of her neighbors lying on the bed dead.

Mrs. Comstock never fully recovered from an attack of pneumonia experienced nearly a year ago, but her death came as a great surprise to the family. The funeral was held in the Christian church Sunday afternoon and interment made in the Silverton cemetery.
