enemy."

Situation Last Night
London, April 17.—The fighting on the Flanders front has spread northward to the Ypres salient and the entire northern half of the German wedge is the scene of bloody combats, according to Field Marshal Haig's night report.

Wytchaeete on the northeastern slopes of the famous Messines ridge is in the hands of the enemy. They have also obtained a footing in Metcra, a miles west of Baillieu.

Haig reported "increased artillery activity on both sides in the Paschendale (Ypres salient)." On the northern flank of the Picardy front, severe fighting is under way around Boyelles, seven miles south of Arras, where the Germans attacked yesterday.

The German war office merely reported the capture of Baillieu and the storming of the Wytchaeete heights. The French communique described violent mutual cannonading in the vicinity of Montdidier, but there was no infantry action there.

Tonight at the armory the people of Salem will have an opportunity of hearing an address by a Cambridge University man. This young Englishman enlisted as a private but is now second lieutenant in the British Royal Field Artillery. His name is Hector McQuarrie.

He was one of the first to enlist from England and was in the battle of the Marne and in the thick of the fight until about a year ago when he was incapacitated.

He is 26 years of age and is said to have a fine attractive personality. Salem people who heard him in Portland report most favorably and in fact, say he is the best speaker on war subjects that has been in the west.

He comes here under the auspices of the Committee of Public Safety. With him tonight is Lieutenant Thos. H. Boyd of American Lake, who will tell of life at that cantonment.

Sixteenth style which has come down to them from a grandmother and which is finished in strips of brass engraved by hand. With the money which they receive they can procure other articles less indispensable.

"In the Seventeenth century the art crafts were very flourishing in Alsace. The house furnishing, which one encountered even in the smallest, most far away villages were elegant and solid. The styles which bear the names of the kings of France, and which, in the villages, were of fine and delicate workmanship, acquired in the country districts a character entirely original, rustic. It is these that the antiquarians are now after. As a consequence while attending auction sales they find time also to seek out the little Alsatian homes and find little difficulty by paying the country people in actual currency in acquiring the old family clocks, of which the majority no longer run, and the chairs within their magnificent backs were by age."

"The demand for objects of this sort has increased immensely during the year that has just finished. The real buyers of them are to be found in the large cities. For the most part they are the 'new rich' who have made their fortunes from the war and who from one day to the other find themselves transported from the counter to the top of German society and seek by all means to surround themselves with objects of ancient art."

last with the Pershing expedition. Pershing himself is known to have been dissatisfied at the aviation contribution.

At the war department it was said President Wilson had awaited the secretary's return before making any decision as to the Marshall aviation report understood to recommend a civilian aircraft head.

Baker's friends regard his trip as a real landmark in the prosecution of the war.

Its main object was to urge actual co-ordination and co-operation in the war task. The result to date was General Pershing's offer of American troops for brigading with the French and British, appointment of General Peche as allied commander in chief and speeding of the American troop movements to France.

His observations will lead to further changes in the war department.

The reorganization due to appointment of Edward Pietrius as an assistant secretary of war is not fully completed, but will carry with it an injection of new efficiency, according to departmental authorities.

Persons close to Baker described his feelings on the western struggle as one of appreciation of the German menace, coupled with confidence in the ultimate turn of events towards the American allied side.

April 16—(Night)—Two American patrols crossed No Man's Land northwest of Toul this morning and cleared out German machine gun positions. They found the enemy gone.

Americans wounded in last week's battle are begging their nurses to let them out for another whack at the enemy.

The weather is damp and cold and the ground is muddy.

Battleplane Downed
Paris, April 17.—A German battleplane has been downed between Creve Coeur and Le Grand Bretail (about fifty miles northwest of Paris), it was officially announced today.

Canada is catching up, having advanced its clock one hour Sunday morning.

Bolsheviki Fire at Railway Station

Tokio, April 17.—(Delayed)—Bolshevik leaders on the Manchurian-Siberian border delivered an ultimatum to Chinese authorities demanding the delivery of the Cosack Leader Semionoff, and the dismantling of his force, according to a dispatch to the Kokusai received here from Peking today.

When the Chinese refused to turn Semionoff over to the bolshevik, says the dispatch, they bombarded a railway station on the Manchurian border. The shells, however, fell short.

The bolsheviks are concentrating forces near Vladivostok.

Second Ship Launched

Eureka, Cal., April 17.—The 2500 ton wooden steamer Jenn D'Arc was launched from the Rolph Shipyard here at 5 a. m. today. It is the second vessel launched from the Rolph yard this spring.
