Call It Forgery and
Blame Monk For It

Amsterdam, April 20.—A French monk who acts as the empress' confessor is blamed for the "forgery" in Emperor Karl's new famous letter to Prince Sixtus De Bourbon, according to dispatches received from Vienna today.

The emperor, it was said, wrote the letter in German and gave it to the monk for translation into French. The monk is alleged to have inserted the word "justified" in regard to the reference to France's claims to Alsace. The monk then took the letter to Switzerland, it was said.

Mexican General Hunting Real Trouble

Juarez, Mex., April 20.—General Francisco Murguía is dickering with German subjects in Mexico for the use of more

German money, according to arrivals here today.

According to these arrivals, General Murguía will entertain a number of prominent Germans from Torreon, Jimenez and other large northern Mexican cities at Chihuahua City tonight. According to word reaching here this meeting is for the purpose of arranging for another German loan.

COLONEL POPE DEAD

Hartford, Conn., April 20.—Colonel George Pope, aged 74, president and later receiver of the Pope Manufacturing company, is dead here today. He was formerly president of the National Association of Manufacturers. He was born in Boston and was a veteran of the civil war.

Carthage Makes Record So Does Other Towns

Washington, April 20.—A tale of two cities:

Carthage, Ohio's liberty loan quota was \$24,050. It subscribed \$1,089,700, about 2400 per cent above its share.

The town of (deleted) with six wealthy prominent men, subscribed \$200 to the first and second liberty loans, none to the third and gave the Red Cross \$149.

When these "men" applied for a bank charter the controller of the currency decided today that they were unfit to administer the affairs of a national bank.

Mexican Revolution Is Growing Serious

Brownsville, Texas, April 20.—Carrazza government officials were taking active steps today to suppress a "revolution" led by Luis Caballero. Concentration of federal troops at Matamoros, opposite this city, was under way.

Caballero's "insurrection" has assumed serious proportions. His forces are in possession of Victoria, capital of Tamaulipas state. Four Carranza generals, including General Eugenio Lopez, have joined forces with him. The railway connecting Tampico with Victoria has been dynamited.

A detachment of the revolutionists was reported marching against Matamoros.

Woodburn citizens are subscribing money for a city service flag that will cost \$50.

Former High Official Declares She will Soon Be Back Fighting For Allies

New York, April 20.—Russia, temporarily out of the ranks of the "fighters for freedom and democracy" is beginning to reassert herself and will soon come back into the ranks, A. A. Boublukov, former commissaire of the duma and minister of communication in Russia, declared here today.

"Speaking as a Russian citizen and in the name of a country which has had eight million casualties in the war against Prussia, I can assure you that Russia, at heart, is still with you," Boublukov declared.

"In spite of the 'German' peace concluded in the name of Russia by a group of political adventurers, the overwhelming majority of Russian people are still with you, the allied democracies and their cause."

"This period of misorganization cannot last much longer and as soon as Russia re-asserts herself, she will come back into your ranks—again a fighting power for the cause of freedom."

Russia's financial collapse was the cause of her present disorganization, Boublukov stated. Prior to the war there was only about one billion and a half rubles worth of paper money; at the bolshevik revolt eighteen billions in script. This excessive issue caused prices to soar thirty to fifty fold. Then bankruptcy in the rear crippled the military organization at the front. The Germans and bolsheviks did the rest.

Boublukov just recently arrived from Russia and is now speaking in favor of the third liberty loan.

WAS ON CYCLOPS.

Los Angeles, Cal., April 20.—"Ray is safe."

This laconic telegram received by Mrs. Ray Hutchins from a son in the navy was the only news of the safety of the United States collier Cyclops, missing for a month and given up as lost. Ray Hutchins, mentioned in the dispatch, was a seaman aboard the Cyclops. A week ago Mrs. Hutchins received word from Wheeler Hutchins, another son, that his brother was lost with the Cyclops.

Rabbit Scalp Bounty Is Held Illegal

In answer to an inquiry from Burns, Oregon, as to whether the rabbit scalp bounty law passed by Harney county was valid, Attorney General Brown refers the inquirer to a decision of the supreme court in which it was held that such county legislation was invalid.

As to whether a person could pay their taxes, deducting the amount of the levy for the rabbit scalp tax, the opinion is expressed that the tax collector is obliged to accept a payment on taxes provided the payment equals one half of the whole amount of tax due, less the amount paid back for a special levy.

Of course, in so paying taxes, the man who pays is running the risk of having a tax delinquency certificate issued against him and for the amount withheld. But in Harney county, where the law passed by the county was declared invalid in another case by the supreme court, a man withholding the amount of the rabbit scalp bounty would be running but little chance.

But the point is made that the tax collector must accept a tender of money for taxes, even if part of the amount due is withheld.

Bruce Dennis For Rep. Nat'l Committeeman

Republicans of Oregon have been dissatisfied for years with the manner in which the office of National Committeeman has been handled, and it is in response to requests from all corners of the state that I ask the support of party members for this non-salaried office.

The weight of Republican principles will then be felt and men for office will be selected by party members with great care because of the responsibility which true Republican principles attach to any square dealing citizen.

Colonel Roosevelt is today rightfully the dominant character in the Republican party and I know that Oregon Republicans, with possibly a few exceptions, agree with me that he is our greatest statesman, and that his wisdom in governmental affairs should be heeded by all members of our party. Should you choose me as your National Committeeman, Oregon's Republican organization will have the benefit of Colonel Roosevelt's counsel and advice.

I ask your support that you and I may have a Republican party that is thoroughly progressive, thoroughly sincere, thus changing it from a lifeless, unmodified organization of the few to a virile, active institution of the many.

SILVERTON BOY DIES.

Mrs. Katherine Dwir received word by telegram Thursday of last week of the death of her son, Garrie R. Dwir, which occurred in a hospital at Quebec, Canada.

Garrie Randall Dwir was born in Silvertown, March 25, 1892, and was 26 years and 17 days old at the time of his death. He lived in Silvertown until six years old and from here moved to California with his parents, where he spent his boyhood days.

He served four years in the U. S. navy and enlisted in the 26th Canadian Reserve company B, and soon after left for France. He was slightly wounded on February 10, 1917, and was seriously wounded on April 10, 1917. He was then sent to Brameholt Military hospital, and later to the Military hospital in Liverpool, and there remained until he was sent to the hospital at Quince, Canada, where he died.—Silvertown Tribune.

SERGEANT MCDANIEL WRITES FROM FRANCE

Heard Officer Swear at Negro and Discovered It Was— Lew Compton

Sergeant Bruce McDaniel of the 18th engineers now on active duty in France writes some interesting news to his brother Ivan G. McDaniel, manager of the Salem Commercial club. He writes in part:

"We are living better than ever before. I have just completed a menu for our camp for the week. While it does not include the unique dishes of the Hawaiian Islands, yet it fills up the inner man with calories, and that is the purpose of beans."

"You will note that the Sunday evening meal is light. Will explain by saying that on Sunday evenings nearly all the men are enjoying the hospitality of some French family and we therefore cut down our menu for that evening."

"Salem is getting into the scrap. For a while the engineers were the only ones here. Now we find an occasional fellow from home. Last week my clerk ate dinner with Dr. Carl Gregg Doney at the Y. M. C. A. where the Rev. James Elvin and George Watson are on duty."

"Was going to a near by camp in a sidecar yesterday morning and we were halted by a French train. Near me, seated on a bridge timber, was a typical southern negro, a member of a service battalion recruited after duty here. He nonchalantly whittled at a piece of wood, never looking to right or left."

The Negro Saluted

"A side car with an officer in it approached the track. The officer saw that he was noticed by the negro but the latter never budged an inch or raised his head. The car passed by the negro and then the officer directed the driver to pass the fellow again, which he did. Seeing there was a deliberate plot to cheat him out of his salutation, the officer drove within a few centimeters of the negro's foot."

"Nigger," he demanded in a stern voice, "are you paralyzed?" The negro jumped to his feet with an attempted bewildered look on his face. "No, sah! No, sah! General, I'm not paralyzed. No, sah!"

"Why didn't you salute then," demanded the officer, who wore huge light colored horn-rimmed glasses. "I didn't see yuh, General, as such as your 'e born, I didn't," answered the negro.

"You are a damn liar, you did see me," replied the officer. "Next time I pass you get up off that leg with your carcass and salute." Salute the negro did.

"Fellow sure has to be hard boiled over in this country," murmured the officer as he started ahead again. "I looked into his face directly for the first time. It was jolly old Lew Compton. Can you beat it?"

St. Louis, Mo., April 20.—Three children were dead and another hauled beyond recognition and near death today, victims of their mother's revenge upon her husband for threatening to place her in an insane asylum.

Pacifist Church Is Sore Spot To Students

Berkeley, Cal., April 20.—The tent tabernacle and cottages of the "Church of the Living God" were in ruins today, following the third visit of a mob of University of California students last night.

Three hundred students broke up services, smashed the furniture and set fire to the tabernacle. After firemen had turned their hose on the mob, the students serpenitined through the streets of Berkeley, singing the Star Spangled Banner. No attempt was made to arrest them.

DEATH OF MRS. MAGNUSEN.

Mrs. Martha Magnusen died at the home of her son, O. L. Magnusen, Woodburn, Monday, April 15, aged 87 years, 4 months and 9 days. She was a native of Norway and was born December 6, 1820. With her husband, Lars Magnusen, and children she came to America in 1870, settling on a homestead near Columbus, Nebraska, where Mr. Magnusen died 13 years ago. She resided there until 1913, when she came here to make her home with her son. Three children survive her—M. L. Magnusen, of Lead, South Dakota; Mrs. Ida M. Vore of Burlington, Cal., and O. L. Magnusen of Woodburn—also six grandchildren and one great grandchild. Deceased was a member of the Norwegian Lutheran church.

The funeral under the direction of E. N. Hall, was Tuesday afternoon, services being held at the Methodist Episcopal church at 2 o'clock. Rev. Edward G. Docker, D. D., officiating. Many friends of the family attended and brought floral pieces. Interment was at Belle Park cemetery.—Woodburn Independent.
