economic problems of interest to dairying communities.

The studies of the week will be thoroughly practical and local and based on the every day experience of the boys and girls. The purpose of this rural life week in the schools is to bring the attention of the pupils to the great American problem and that is the market basket.

The schools of Marion county will do everything possible to increase the food supply and the week's discussion of farm products is to interest the children in doing their share.

AMERICANS FOUGHT FIRST REAL BATTLE AND WON VICTORY

Claim of Germans That 183 Were Taken Prisoners May Be True

New York, April 22.—American troops have fought at Seicheprey their first real battle of the war, and have come through the engagement with victory.

All previous attacks by the Germans against the American positions in eastern France have been raids or reconnaissance for the purpose of securing information for Von Hindenburg. The assault this week-end at Seicheprey, however, was not of this character. It shows every evidence of having been an attempt by Hindenburg to seize permanently the village held by the Americans, and to improve the German positions opposite that part of General Pershing's line.

Failure to accomplish this purpose was complete. The official Berlin report that the Germans destroyed "enemy works" in the American positions is unimportant, in view of the fact that the Germans were forced back to their own lines. The purpose of Hindenburg to consolidate the American-held sector with the German front is sufficiently indicated by the action of the Germans in remaining over night in the American positions they had temporarily occupied.

It is apparent that the Americans made a strategic retirement before the initial rush of the Germans, either the German force was largely superior in numbers or because a German barrage fire gave indications of cutting off the Americans. The counter attack of Pershing's fighters demonstrates conclusively that the original retirement, however, was well devised and succeeded in its purpose of conserving the American forces for a more favorable assault.

The German claim of 183 prisoners being captured may be true. The Americans very probably would be reluctant to obey orders to fall back in their first encounter with the enemy. Hesitancy on the part of an advanced unit to retire may well have caused its isolation by barrage fire and its necessary capitulation. Americans have a certain quality of recklessness which may cause occasional mistakes like this, but which in the end means victory.

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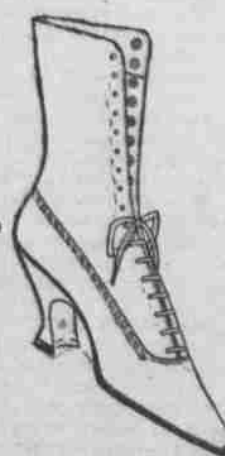
