GERMAN'S NEXT DRIVE

"Near Seicheprey Bavarian troops stormed American positions, advancing two kilometers (about a mile and a quarter)," the statement said. "They repulsed counter attacks, and after destroying the enemy works, withdrew to their original line. "They took prisoner 183 Americans, including five officers and captured 25 machine guns. The American losses

were extraordinarily high."

In describing the same action, the French war office declared the Americans repulsed a lively German attack Saturday night. Later it was stated that the allied line had been entirely re-established.

"In the region of Seicheprey Saturday night, Americans repulsed a lively German attack," the communique said. "We regained most of the lost ground."

British Make Gains

London, April 22.—"We improved our position during the night in the Villers-Bretonneux (ten miles east of Amiens). Albert and Robecq sectors." Field Marshal Haig reported today. "South and north of Lens (midway

NO USE IN TRYING TO BEAT POSTOFFICE

Putting Matches In Packages Endangers Lives—Best Plan Is To "Tote Fair"

What's the use of attempting to slip by the local postoffice inspectors and sending matches or perishes to the boys over there?

One may misrepresent to the officials here, but when that package arrives in New York it will run up against a few thousand critical officials who make it their special business to minutely inspect every article and every package, as the post office officials are taking no chances of any one slipping our soldier boys something that might not be exactly right.

Nor is there any use of having the box inspected and weighed here and then on the way, shipping in a box of matches. The New York examiners will promptly throw out the whole box when they run across those matches.

A few days ago a woman mailing a package from Salem managed to sneak in a few bananas after the box had been properly inspected here. Such things not only get the local authorities in bad, but nothing is gained as the New York inspection department isn't taking any chances.

Moral: Tote fair with the local post office authorities, for even if one manages to lie about it and get a package started, there is the New York office with its thousands of post office sleuths right on the job.

Market Indicates Expansion of Trade

New York, April 22.—The New York Evening Sun financial review today said:

While today's stock market was not uncommonly active nor yet plentiful of features of conspicuous interest of a speculative character, it displayed, nevertheless, indications of a gradual expansion in trading both in volume and in application to a larger number of stocks dealt in.

United States Steel and Republic Iron and Steel were rather sluggish in comparison with other stocks. Crucible gained over 2½ points. All the equipment shares were likewise strong. A good deal of attention was attracted by various specialties comprising American Cotton Oil, Mexican Petroleum, Great Northern Ore, United States Rubber common and first preferred, Distillers, Industrial Alcohol, Virginia Carolina Chemical, Colorado Fuel and American Sumatra Tobacco.

The railroad department was quiet and heavy. St. Paul was distinctly weak. At mid-day trading died down considerably, but after some irregularity, prices continued to show strength. As the afternoon advanced prices receded from the top of the day, although net changes were in most cases still a fraction to a point above the Saturday closing level.

Offerings were restricted and were absorbed.

"In different sectors there was considerable reciprocal artillery fighting. The enemy shelling was directed chiefly astride the Somme and the Aisne, in the Lens sector, and in the neighborhood of Festubert and Nieppe forest."

"A strong local attack was made by the enemy last night in the neighborhood of Mesnil (four miles north of Albert) accompanied by heavy shelling. After sharp fighting, during the course of which the enemy captured an advanced post, the attack was completely repulsed."

Attacks Repulsed

Paris, April 22.—"German surprise attacks were repulsed east of Rheims and east of the Aisne," the French war office reported today.

"In the region of Thennes (near Hangard-Santerre), we took some prisoners."

"Artillery fire continues active on various parts of the front."

Punished the Germans

Washington, April 22.—American forces in the battles of Seicheprey, while suffering the heaviest losses in their fighting to date, inflicted casualties numbering close to 500 on the Germans, General Pershing reported today to the war department.

The losses have not been checked up, but are known to have been less than the Germans, it was stated.

Nothing has been made public as yet regarding the total Americans captured, but war department officers said it was not improbable that both sides had made numerous captures. They won't the Berlin figures, however—183 captured.

Bombarding Amiens

London, April 22.—The bombardment of Amiens has been heavily renewed, according to a dispatch today from the British front. Three additional hits have been made on the famous Amiens cathedral.

falling glass and bricks, but none seriously.

More than 20 business buildings in Hemet were completely wrecked. At San Jacinto 1 buildings and many brick residences crumbled. Many large plate glass windows in downtown Los Angeles were shattered and cracks appeared in the walls of a number of buildings. The shock, however, was not as severe here as in the inland towns, and no serious damage was reported except in Hemet and San Jacinto.

Damage Half Million.

Telephone messages from those towns early today fixed the total damage at approximately \$500,000, practically all of which resulted from the destruction of business buildings.

The shock was felt in western Arizona though no damage was reported there. Three men entombed in a shallow magnesite mine near Hemet when the shaft caved in. They were reached by working parties late yesterday.

At San Jacinto the tremor was felt only faintly.

Seismographs at San Diego and Los Angeles recorded the main shock as of two seconds duration, but the disturbance continued for nearly two hours.

The San Jacinto river which heretofore was a dry bed, was flowing a foot of water soon after the earthquake. It was believed an irrigation ditch near the base of the San Jacinto mountains had broken and let its water into the river bed.

Water mains and electric conduits were broken at San Jacinto and Hemet but service was partially restored last night. Although people rushed from their homes into the street at the shock, no panic resulted.

BEEF TAKES JUMP

Portland, Ore., April 22.—The most sensational advance and the greatest individual one ever made in the cattle market here, was shown during the day at North Portland with a sheer rise of \$1.25 and \$1.50 per hundred pounds. Steers sold as high as \$14 but the general market top was considered around \$13.75, the highest open market transaction in the Pacific northwest. Pamished supplies caused the advance.

dered to walk toward the Place Des Tillouls. They who did not walk fast enough were shot down.

"A Flemish clock maker came out of his dwelling supporting his aged father-in-law; he was ordered to hold up his hands, but he could not do so without letting the old man fall, so a soldier struck him in the neck with an ax. Arrived at the Place Des Tillouls the woman and children were separated from the men. Unhappily the soldiers picked out thirty or forty men and shot them down in cold blood. And all the while, day and night, in the flaming streets, the pillage and the murder went on. The man who described it all to me had a vivid memory of a 'tall, red headed soldier' who was particularly conspicuous by the ferocity which which he wielded the ax and mutilated his victims, a baby among them, in the arms of its mother."

Speaking of the destruction of Bormeerbeek near Malines, Whitlock says that every time the German army was

thrown back upon it, they burned forty houses.

Just Wholesale Murder

At Dinant, Whitlock declares:

"Women and children were forced to stand by and witness the murder of husbands and fathers. One woman, Madame Alain, who had given birth to a child three days before, was borne forth on a mattress by German soldiers, who said they would compel her to look on while they shot her husband, but her cries and supplications finally moved the soldiers to spare the husband's life."

"In the little graveyard beside the church at Taminies there are hundreds of new made graves," writes Whitlock. "The crosses stand in serried rows. They are all neat, of painted wood, alike except for the names and ages—from 13 to 84. But they all bore the same sinister date, August 22, 1914."

"About six hundred men were massed in St. Martin's square by the river bank, and the women folk, their wives, mothers, daughters, were assembled to witness the scene."

Quoting an eye witness, Whitlock described how the Germans lined up the victims, then tumbled 10 of them back

were swept away by the bullets. After dark the German soldiers, with pocket flashlights, went among the bodies killing the wounded.
