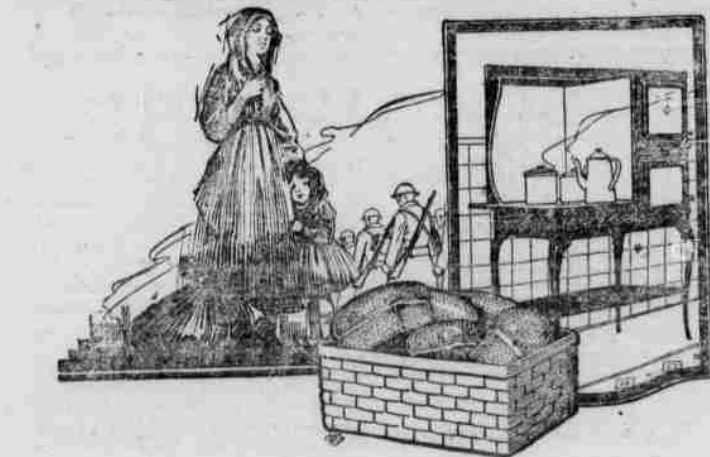

In some rare cases water was forced from the earth like a geyser and new springs were developed. The flame that dozens of people saw flash up simultaneously with the earthquake, cannot be explained, nor can the great clouds of dust that enveloped the mountain range.

EMPLOYEES OF STATE ATTEMPT BIG CLUB METHODS ON VOTERS

The Penitentiary Contingent Bumped Into Wrong Man at Hopmere Recently

Governor Withycombe's state employees are doing some coarse campaigning for their chief.

Down at Hopmere one day last week a man named Martin, supposed in some way to be connected with the penitentiary, and Joe Keller, parole officer, gave a sample of the methods used. Martin was distributing lithographs of the governor and Keller was driving the automobile, presumably a state owned machine, although this is not positively known. They stopped at the Hopmere store, owned by S. A. Harris and son. Martin approached the store where a group of men was standing and asked if he might put a picture of the governor in the window.

Mr. Harris replied that he did not care to post a picture of Withycombe since he was supporting another candidate for governor. Martin at once flared up and blurted out as he hurried away: "Well, you might at least be patriotic!"

Mr. Harris, naturally riled by this insinuation, immediately proceeded to inform the state employees that he probably owned as many, or more, "christ" stamps and liberty bonds than his detractors, and that they could not intimidate him into supporting Withycombe by any such methods. In this view he was supported by all the bystanders present, who recognized in the incident some very coarse work on the part of the governor's state-paid campaigners.

The insinuation that Withycombe is the only patriotic candidate before the people, unfair to his opponents, is being resented on all sides, and the use of state employees in spreading this propaganda is generally condemned.

Mr. Harris seems to have expressed plainly and frankly a very common sentiment in this part of the valley.

American Prisoners Held In Germany

Washington, April 23.—Germany holds seven American naval prisoners—five from the armed guard of the steamer *Canton*, two from the destroyer *Jaeger* Jones—Secretary Daniels announced today.

He and Secretary of State Lansing were to confer today over alleged mistreatment of American prisoners in German camps though the state department had already taken steps to obtain the actual facts and to report on any inhumane treatment.

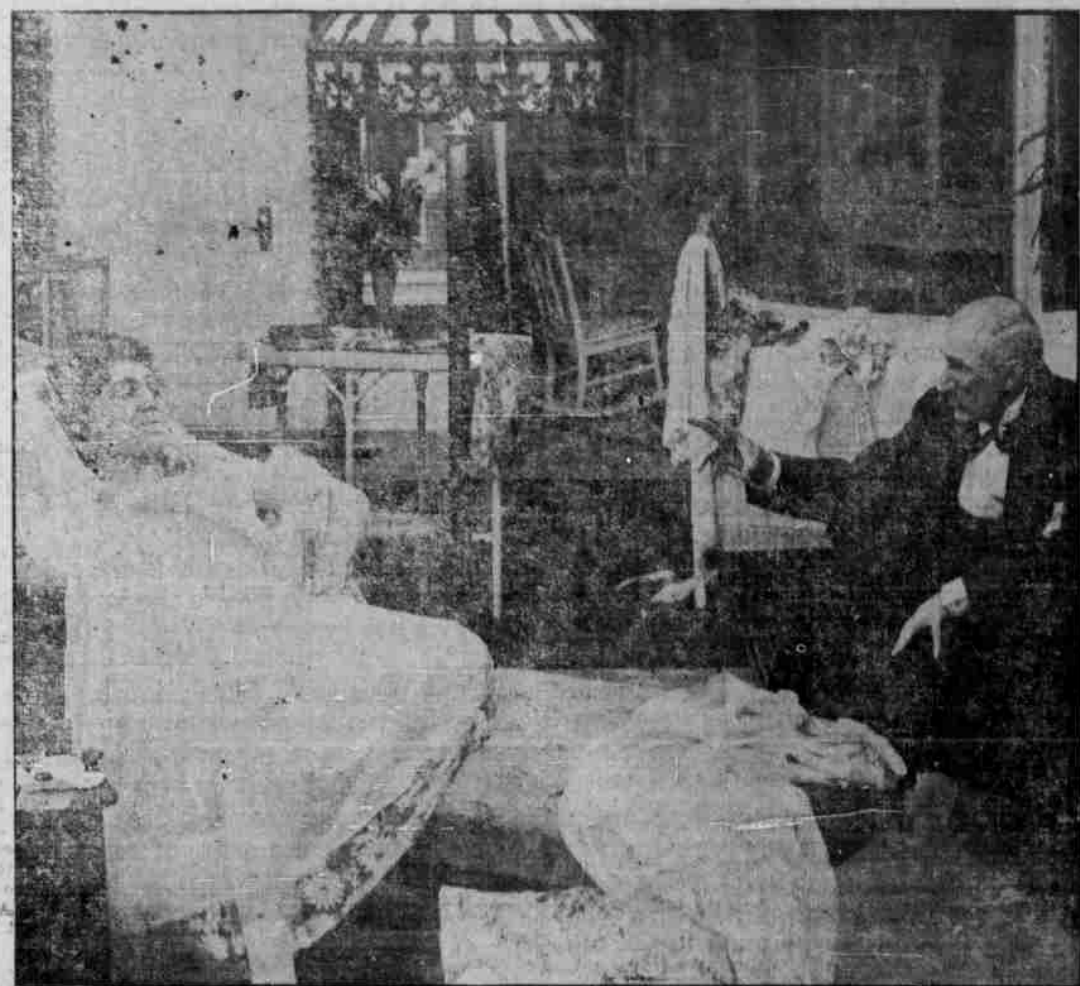

er high for lighting the bridge. Plans for lighting had been submitted to the commercial club by Manager W. M. Hamilton of the Portland Railway Light and Power company. The bill introduced by Alderman West, that the city pay half of the \$50 a month brought from Alderman Ward the remark that it wasn't necessary to have such extra ornamental fixtures and that \$10 a month should be enough for lighting purposes. The committee on lights will figure out just what share the city should pay.

Gideon Stolz, in a letter to the council suggested that the time for bonding delinquent street assessments be extended 60 days. Mayor Keyes said the time had already been extended 60 days but that people might still pay up interest and bond. Only two certificates of delinquency have been sold to date.

The amendment to the vagrancy ordinance, prohibiting idlers of any kind between the age of 18 and 50 years, introduced by Alderman Ward, was referred to the ordinance committee. bullets into Ram Chandra sitting again in a few feet of him. Turning again, he fired apparently at Dr. C. K. Chakravarty, and then sent two more bullets wildly about the room.

One shot narrowly missed the court stenographer. Two others went over the heads of the jury.

Marshal Fires Once
Marshal Holohan, sitting nearby, fired one shot, which struck Ram Singh in the body. He died almost instantly. Military officers entered the courtroom a few minutes after the shooting and martial law was declared. Nobody was allowed to leave the court room

and everybody was subjected to a thorough search for weapons. United States Attorney Preston was standing within a few feet of Ram Singh when he began shooting. Preston declared a few minutes later that he believed one of the bullets was intended for him.

Ram Chandra was editor of the Hindustani Ghadr and had for many years been a leader in the Indian revolutionary movement. The government alleged in the present prosecutions that Chandra's organization was used by the Germans to foster an uprising against British rule in India.

Ever since the beginning of the trial on November 20 latter feeling has existed between the two Hindu castes, many members of which are under indictment. The Ghadr party, led by Ram Chandra, was alleged to have employed members of the lower caste Singa party to handle the more dan-

gerous enterprises undertaken, the government charges, at the direct instigation of the German foreign office.

Ram Singh and others of his party have blamed Ram Chandra and the Ghadr for their present predicament. The 31 defendants on trial include many Hindus of both castes, several Germans, including former Consul General Franz Bopp, and practically the entire former consulate staff at San Francisco, and several Americans alleged to have assisted in the attempted shipment of arms to India.
