Twenty Are Dead and Twenty-Three Wounded

Washington, April 24.—Forty three casualties, listed by the war department today showed six killed in action, three dozen of wounds, eleven of disease, ten severely wounded and thirteen slightly wounded. Severely Wounded: Corporal Vinal B. Rideout, Privates Steve Adams, Hermidas Desrochers, John W. Gosinski, William E. Loper, Edward E. Monahan, Thomas Morrison, Louis H. Palmer, Garred Stillings, Carl L. Witham. Lieutenant Benville Wheat was among the slightly wounded.

Prospects Are Good For Another Company

It is probable that what is now known as company P of the first battalion, Oregon militia, will be formally mustered in, although under a different company letter. Three companies of the Oregon militia have already been formed in Salem and the prospects are good for another. It is the intention to use these companies only for local emergencies. Within a short time it is probable that the Salem companies will be organized as the Oregon Second battalion. Men between the ages of 18 and 45 years are eligible, although a man over 45 years may join if he is of reasonable physical ability or has had military experience.

Seattle, Wash., April 24.—Card filing systems bearing names of 20,000 members of the I. W. W., a dictaphone outfit and lithographing equipment for circulating propaganda was seized by deputy sheriffs in a raid on a house at 45th avenue and Genesee street. Two men giving their names as Bert Lewis and G. Pratt were placed under arrest. They carried organizers documents signed by Bill Hayward. The sheriff's attention was directed to the house by persons who suspected it was a moonshine headquarters. Protected by trees, it was isolated from general view.
