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troubles the government had had, not only in St. Mary's logging camp in Idaho, but in the mining districts in Arizona and Montana, as well as the logging districts in the northern part of the state of Washington, from which hundreds of L. W. W. men were driven, and his appeal to the men be fore him, just released from their day's work—many of them wearing Liberty Loan buttons, and his suggestion that if any of these L. W. W. men showed up in Salem, and started anything with any of them, that he be given a good thumping, brought out rounds of applause.

Lieutenant Dean said that it was more important to the government now, that the men who remained at home produce logs and lumber for ships and airplanes, than if these same men were on the firing line in France—in fact, he said, that at Vancouver, Washington, there is now a large regiment of loggers and lumbermen at work in the woods, and in the mills, getting out lumber for ships and air planes, which the government must have at any price.

"The government knows in this war but one class—Americans, who can fight in France, and the men here to furnish them the munitions and fighting tools. If we do not lick the Germans now in France, with the aid of our allies, we will have to fight them alone here in America, or they will do the same unspeakable horrors that they perpetrated upon the Belgians and French, over there."

"I was at the camp in St. Johns, Oregon, a short time ago, and they are not only building ships there, but before I left the men had subscribed most liberally to the third issue of The Liberty Loan bonds. It takes money, and plenty of it, as well as ships and air planes to win this war."

"Not a man, who was invited to ask questions about the new order they were asked to join, but stepped up to the improvised desks, signed his name, received his membership card and button, upon being told that if, at any future time there might be strikes to settle and that the government always saw to it that the workmen obtained a square deal, as has been demonstrated in the past, with the net result that one hundred and forty-six names were enrolled, with the appointment of J. W. Rubble, as local secretary, who will see that all the members of the new order are kept supplied with government information that may be of interest to them, from time to time, and a special flag will be provided in the near future, which will unfurl the stars and stripes over this latest addition to the workers of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, in Salem."

Oregon Home Fires Burning.

It may be of interest to add that Lieutenant Dean, is an Oregon boy, and has relatives in Salem. He in closing his short address, said that he was more than proud of his home state, which so far, had shown but few L. W. W.'s, or other alien enemies, and in subscribing to Liberty Loan bonds, had more than made good, not only had furnished and, now had in France some of the bravest men on the firing line, and those who "Keep the Home Fires Burning," are doing just as much to whip the Germans, as our boys "over there."

vided because the peasants were objecting.

Besides the war ridden Ukraine has no surplus, while in some centers the population is reduced to rationing.

As for the vital iron ore and manganese, the dispatches said, the turmoil in Russia had prevented the mining of them.

Representatives of the central powers are to confer this week in Vienna with Ukraine officials over the wheat problem.

Advices through diplomatic sources indicate that German women have caused considerable inconvenience to the government by their willingness to accept "peace terms."

Alarm has also been occasioned in

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Germany by the scarcity of metal. So serious has the situation become that the Prussian minister of war has ordered that all bronze and copper values without particular artistic value be sent to foundries to be melted into war materials.
