swearing of first witnesses. The defense expected a trial lasting from four to eighteen months, possibly a new record. William Haywood, leader of the 122 defendants, saw a mass of documents from his personal files spread before the court and identified by his stenographer. The court overruled objections of the defense as to the propriety of that evidence. The government, having sustained its point was prepared to offer bales of I. W. W. papers, telegrams and letters. One card index to be offered in evidence alone contains 36,000 cards. That is a mere beginning. The government also expects to call hundreds of witnesses from all parts of the country, including town and state officers from localities where the I. W. W. are known to have committed overt acts between April 6, 1917, and their indictment in September, 1917.

newspapers and proclamations thrown into the enemy's trenches? (c)—All other information on the enemy's conduct. "At the same time, interpreters will send to the chief of the information bureau a detailed report on all conversations they have had with the enemy. "The enemy's positions when propaganda is under way must not be shelled by our artillery. They must only be bombarded in case of attack. The company commanders must indicate to the batteries the positions of these points to be spared. "The enemy is perfidious and without honor and it is necessary as a consequence to be careful that they neither take our propagandists prisoner nor kill them. Those of our soldiers who leave our lines for the purpose of carrying newspapers and pamphlets to the enemy must be advised. To protect them it will be necessary to constitute with care special detachments who will move guard in the trenches and who will fire only on the order of the company commander who is directing the relations with the enemy."

expansion resources of the twelve federal reserve banks increased \$2,320,463,000 in the year prior to December 30, 1917, covered by the report. The tremendous gain was about evenly distributed according to the ratio of reserve capital in each district showing a generally satisfactory ory condition through all parts of the country. Total resources at the close of 1917 were \$3,089,945,000 against \$769,482,000 on December 30, 1916. Due to the policy of gold conservation, the board ordered withdrawal from circulation nearly \$1,000,000,000 of gold.

The void was filled with an unusual issue of federal reserve notes. Federal reserve notes in circulation at the close of 1917 aggregated \$1,246,912,000. On December 30, 1916, federal reserve notes in actual circulation totalled \$275,125,000.

Net deposits of the twelve banks, increased \$803,082,000 last year. The figures for the two years are: December 30, 1917, \$1,487,994,000; December 30, 1916, \$684,912,000. Combined net earnings for the year, the report says, were \$11,202,993, an average of 18.9 per cent on an average aggregate capital of \$59,260,000. Of this sum the New York district earned more than one third, or \$3,718,955.

(Continued from page one) "an appreciable advance" in Hangard wood and occupied Baune wood, southwest of Maily-Raineval, the French war office announced in its night official communique. Only the usual artillery activity was reported elsewhere. Field Marshal Haig reported the repulse of an enemy raid near Hebuterne, in the Albert sector. The German war office announced the occupation of Sebastopol, principal city of the Crimean peninsula, in Russia, without opposition. Regarding the west front, Berlin said "the situation is unchanged."

Hangard wood is a mile north of Hangard-En-Sauzere, where American troops are officially reported brigaded with the French. Maily-Raineval is about midway between the American positions near Hangard and those west of Montdidier.

Haig Reports Only Raids  
London, May 3.—Raids and local fighting in which the British had the advantage, together with mutual cannonading, was reported by Field Marshal Haig today.

"Local fighting in the neighborhood of Villers-Bretonneux (Amiens front) resulted in our advantage last night," Haig said.

"In successful raids south of Arras and east of St. Venant we took ten prisoners and five machine guns. "Artillery was mutually active last

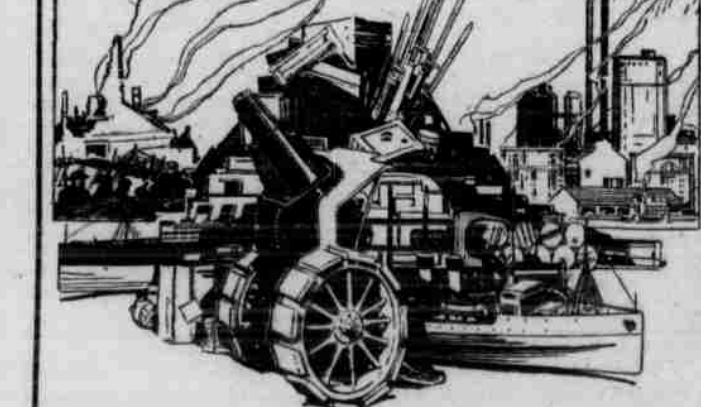
