GREAT DRAFT CALL MADE LATE TODAY BY PROVOST MARSHAL

Oregon and California Quotas Are Not Available For Unknown Reason

Washington, May 3.—The greatest draft call of the war, 235,742 men—was sent out by Provost Marshal General Crowder late today. The mobilization was ordered between May 15 and 30.

Today's call brings May's total up to 305,577 men, 50,000 more than during April.

The men are ordered to entrain during the five days beginning May 25. Among the state quotas, with the camps to which they are assigned, are as follows:

Oregon and California's quotas are not available. Captain Cullison, of the adjutant general's office told the Capital Journal over the telephone from Portland late this afternoon that the figures had not yet been released. He believes the telegram of release has been delayed because of the telegraphers' strike.

BATTLE IN FRANCE IS QUESTION OF ECONOMY OF MEN

London, May 3.—The fighting on the west front is proceeding satisfactorily for the allies inasmuch as Germany is being forced to use up more fresh divisions than England and France, a representative of General Delma Radcliffe, director of operations declared in an interview today.

"We must regard the battle from the viewpoint of economy of men," he said. "Therefore the fighting is proceeding satisfactorily for us, as Germany is using up more fresh divisions than the allies."

"On the northern end of the battle front thirty five fresh German divisions and nine old divisions have been engaged, materially reducing the number of fresh enemy divisions for further fighting. Some of the tired German divisions are recovering, however."

"If the enemy continues his offensive on the northern front he must imperil his chances on the Somme front, where, according to all indications, the main German attack was to be repeated for the purpose of dividing the French and British armies."

"German attacks on the northern battle front since April 23," he continued, "have used up five fresh German divisions and seven to eight enemy divisions which had been previously engaged."

"Success in the battle will rest with the side which is able to keep fresh troops in reserve after its opponent is exhausted."

"Since April 25 the enemy has gained one and one half miles on a seven mile front at the northern end of the battle line, having captured some important tactical positions, including Mount Kemmel."

"Possession of Kemmel gave the enemy 'elbow room.' The German right flank from Kemmel to Wytchachte has been made fairly secure."

"Possession of Kemmel also gives the Germans direct observation of the whole British line from Scharpenberg to Mount Rouge."

Market Is Steady In Wall Street Today

New York, May 3.—The New York Evening Sun financial review today said: In a quiet but generally steady

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market, stocks moved irregularly in the early trading within a comparatively narrow range and reflected a tendency to take profits and to even up commitments over the week end.

Despite recessions, a moderate amount of strength was shown in steel issues and one or two specialties, but coppers were weak. On the whole, trading lacked significance.

The opening was quiet and firm with prices up a fraction to one point over the previous close. In a majority of the active issues the opening was the high for the day, but some issues went fractionally above the opening price, only to participate in recessions during the early trading.

Neither advances nor recessions were large or consistent in the late trading, although Colorado Fuel continued to be a firm feature. Marine preferred was also firm. The rail issues were neglected. Trading as a whole continued dull. No stock was offered in large volume.

State House News

The Public service commission reports that for the first time in years there is a surplus number of cars in Oregon, distributed as follows: Southern Pacific, 188; O. W. K. & N., 2420;

and S. P. & S., 26.

Herbert Nuan, state engineer and J. C. McLeod of the state highway department are home from a trip to Douglas county where they succeeded in acquiring a five mile right of way in the construction of the Pacific highway 12 miles south of Roseburg. The five miles acquired is a portion of the new line that will eliminate Roberts mountain, and will make the road in that section all water grade.

For the benefit of those contemplating an auto tour into southern Oregon the state highway department gives the information that roads known as Pass Creek Canyon and Rice Hill in Douglas county and Wolf Creek hill and Smith mountain road in Josephine county are all in good shape, having been recently dragged and graded. The counties along the highway have put the connecting strips of road in traveling condition. For the past two weeks autos have been traveling over this road.

E. R. Shepard of Washington City, is in Salem in conference with the railroad commission. He represents the Bureau of Standards and is giving lectures before engineers in the west. He was formerly professor of engineering at the O. A. C. Mr. Shepard will visit his brother Ralph Shepard in Polk county before returning. While in Salem he is a guest at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John R. Lewis.
