## THIRD LIBERTY LOAN GETS GREAT BOOST IN CLOSING DAYS

### Salem Bond Buyers Are Sending Capital City Over Top Splendidly

Subscriptions for the Third Liberty Loan have taken a sudden jump in the city the past few days. One bank reports subscriptions amounting to \$20,000 coming in this week, and another bank \$5,000 today. The largest subscription today was that of the Oregon State Hospital that invested in the Third Liberty loan the \$25,000 received from the state. The Oregon Electric wired F. G. Deekbeck, chairman of the Marion county Liberty Loan committee, of its purchase in Salem of \$5,000 worth of the loan. The Shell Company of California also announced its purchase in Salem of \$2,500 worth of bonds. It is rumored that a large corporation doing business in Marion county will invest liberally in the Third Liberty bonds. Taking everything into consideration, for the past few days business has been booming in Salem for the Third Liberty loan.

Word was received late this afternoon that the Hammond Lumber Company employees of Mill City have subscribed \$24,000 and an additional \$23,000 is to come in from the San Francisco office, as the portion of the Hammond Lumber Company's own subscription, making a total of \$47,000 coming from Mill City.

### Funeral Services of Late Samuel McBride

Funeral services over the late Samuel B. McBride, whose death occurred yesterday afternoon at his country home in south Salem, will be held Monday forenoon at 10:30 o'clock from the Bigdon chapel. Mr. McBride was 52 years of age and death followed an illness of several years. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. W. H. Boat, of this city, and by two other daughters and one son, as follows: Miss Ella McBride of Seattle, Miss Lizzie McBride of Fresno, Calif., and Haddon McBride of Dixon, Calif. He was the grandfather of Mrs. Anabel Bush.

Mr. McBride had made his home here the past eight years, coming here from Portland where he retired from business eight years ago and selecting the fine country home he has since made his residence. He crossed the plains in the early days, settling in Portland and then returned to Iowa to get his family. He started the Columbia Carriage works in Portland, which he conducted till he retired and came to Salem.

Rev. Carl H. Elliott will have charge of the services. Interment will be in the City View cemetery.
