VICK BROTHERS OPEN BRANCH HOUSE FOR MAXWELL CARS

New Line of Cars and Tractors will Occupy Building at State and Front

On account of the output of the Ford factory being materially reduced and the difficulty in getting cars, Vick Brothers have decided to re-organize their sales force and open up in new quarters, taking on another line of trucks and the agency for the Maxwell car.

After thoroughly investigating the different cars and trucks, they decided to take the sales service of the Maxwell, knowing that the Maxwell branch in Portland is in a position to give prompt service to its agents. This western branch carries in stock a complete assortment and large stock of the Maxwell parts.

The Maxwell headquarters will be located in the large building at the corner of State and Front streets, now occupied by the Purvine Implement company. This building with its large floor space and two floors will give ample room to show the Maxwell cars as well as the Samson tractors. The lower floor of the building will be used as sample rooms while the upper floor will serve as a storage room for auto supplies and surplus automobiles.

George W. Vick of the firm of Vick Brothers will give his personal attention to the Maxwell agency and the business from the new location which will be conducted entirely separate from the Ford business. The Ford agency and its business in its present location will be in charge of Chas. H. Vick.

The new business will probably be conducted under the name of the Valley Motor company with George H. Vick as manager, assisted by Elbert Thompson and R. B. Nicholson as salesmen and Fred Bernardi and Clifford Brunk mechanics.

Fred Fulton was to have been one of the gladiators, but after he had been matched with Willie Meehan he changed his mind, declaring he didn't want to jeopardize his proposed match with Jess Willard.

Leonard and Ritchie will be busy lads while they are here. On Tuesday Leonard boxes Joe Miller at Oakland and Ritchie will enter the ring with Frank Barrien the same evening.

Three Year Olds to Race
Louisville, Ky., May 10.—There will be a duel of three year olds in the 44th renewal of the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs tomorrow and there will be a duel of jockeys which will be no less interesting. It so happens that three of the greatest riders in America will ride the three contenders for derby honors. Jockey Johnny Loftus will have the mount on War Cloud, A. H. Macomber's great son of Polymelus, and Willy Knapp will pilot Willis Sharpe Kilmer's Sunbrar. Jockey Joe Notter will have the mount on Escoba.

If Loftus wins the derby for Macomber he will make up for the derby Loftus took away from him in 1916, when he beat Macomber's Star Hawk a neck with George Smith.

NINE STRAIGHT WIN ON SECOND STRING IS RECORD OF GIANTS

If Not Headed Soon the Race for the Pennant May Be Called Settled

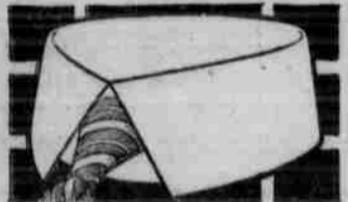
New York, May 10.—With a record of nine straight victories piled up behind them—their second string of that many this year—the Giants traveled west today to take on the strongest half of Governor Tener's baseball league.

This will be the first meeting between the last year's champions and the teams which have been figured to set them back. So far the Giants have accomplished a run of victories that is demoralizing to what has practically become an alleged pennant race. Unless the western teams are able to whittle down the lead of the New Yorkers substantially, they should return to New York so far ahead of the procession that the rest of the race would be a canter.

It was pointed out, however, that in 1906 the Giants were out ahead with a magnificent string of victories at about the same time of the year, and then wasted away to a mere contender before July 4 had livened up the con-

New York, May 10.—A decrease of unfilled tonnage was shown in today's report by the United States Steel Corporation. On April 30 the unfilled tonnage totalled \$741,882, compared with \$9,566,404 on March 31. This is a decrease of 914,522.

A year ago the unfilled tonnage totalled 12,183,083.

False Advertising Costs Russian \$100

Portland, Or., May 10.—Declaring that Portland has reached a "milestone in the advertising business" Judge Rosman made Ivan de Marcell Russian dance instructor the milestone by fining him \$100 for false advertising.

Disregarding the jury's recommendation for leniency, the court declared the case had attracted so much attention

that he chose rather to make an example of the temperamental dancer and his "flamboyant methods" as the jury erred it.

Judge Rosman predicted that "Evelyn" would lose hundreds of dollars in lost patronage. De Marcell has been conducting a dancing class for 200 women here. The specific charge was that he used the pictures of two famous dancers in advertising himself.

Judge Rosman intimated that so far as his court was concerned, false advertising would be held a serious charge.

To the Gas Customers of the Salem Gas Plant Gas Rate Talk No. 4

As an example of the increased costs of operation, the cost of coal has advanced from \$5.44 per ton to \$7.32 per ton, an advance of 35%, with great probability of still further increases. As we used 2,400 tons of coal last year and will probably use at least 2,500 tons this year, it is apparent that the increase in the cost of coal will cause a large increase in the cost of making gas.

Then, too, stokers wages have advanced from \$72.00 per month to \$100.00 per month, an increase of 29%. Most other labor costs have advanced accordingly.

The result of these increased costs will be to cause the gas plant to experience a loss of about \$1,461.00 this year, as shown in Gas Rate Talk No. 2, unless additional revenue is provided to the company by an increase in its rates for gas.

The above loss is the amount that the gross income will be exceeded by the total operating and fixed or overhead expenses. Therefore, the company would not only fail to receive any interest on the investment of \$215,576.78 which the Public Service Commission has determined as being the actual value of the plant, but would also be out the sum of \$1,461.00 above mentioned.
