Submarine Sinkings Are Decreased by Half
Washington, May 11.—Official French statistics as the submarine warfare received here in a dispatch from France today show that the total losses of the allied and neutral ships, including accidents at sea, were approximately one-half as great during April this year as in April 1917.
In April of last year 634,685 gross tons was lost, while this April's figures are 381,631.
Submarine attacks now are more costly to the enemy, the dispatch points out, owing to the fact that the attacks are chiefly made with torpedoes instead of gunfire, as was the case before merchant ships were adequately and efficiently armed.
