Germany Explains Advance
Washington, May 12.—Germany explains her advance into Crimea, in an answer to a soviet protest, by saying she considers herself forced to occupy Sebastopol in view of the attacks made by the Russian Black sea fleet on Kherson and Nikolayev. This was indicated in state department advices today.

The German ambassador at Moscow has told the Russian government in effect that Germany had no intention of forcing any particular form of government in Crimea, but said that province should be subject to the Russian-Ukrainian treaty.

Secret Brest-Litovsk Treaty

Geneva, May 12.—The Gazette has published a dispatch from Petrograd regarding a secret Brest-Litovsk treaty containing a clause in which Russia promises to support, at the general peace conference, the German claim that the Polish question is not an international problem.

Riots in Petrograd

Paris, May 12.—Hunger riots have broken out in Petrograd, according to an undated dispatch from that city, received by the Journal today.

"The position now is," said the summary, "that the Germans, determined to concentrate every available unit on one enormous offensive are draining their country dry to force a decision before it is too late, while the entente are so confident that, having been given the choice of a small immediate American army for defense or waiting till they are reinforced by a complete, powerful, self-supporting American army, they have chosen the latter."

German Situation Critical
"The German commander, seeing how nearly he is delivering himself to the allied reserve, has been compelled to accept temporary failure and call a halt. His position is tactically exposed in two dangerous salients on water-logged ground. His countrymen are dangerously dispirited at the immense price paid for his failure to terminate their sufferings. His allies are on the verge of quarrelling and daily exhibit their growing dislike and distrust of the taskmaster who robs them of their lives and food."

"His reserve have nearly reached complete exhaustion. Those of the Franco-British are still in being, while the American preparations develop. The time draws closer when defeat is inevitable. Therefore, he must renew the offensive."

tensive explorations without encountering any resistance.

Shells heaved over by the German gas projectors recently are of a new type, now popularly designated as "tin cans." They are 18 inches long and eight inches in diameter, blunt at both ends and contain three or four gallons of liquid which evaporates rapidly and throws off a gas. The projectors are not rifled and it is possible to throw these new missiles only a short distance. The gas is a form of phosgene and is capable of spreading a dangerous vapor over an area of fifty yards.

The Germans shot "sneeze gas" first, then phosgene, attempting to give the Yankees a whiff of the former, to force them to remove their gas masks and sneeze, thus enabling the phosgene to do its deadlier work.

The trick failed, as the doughboys are too handy with their masks.

ing in a hot sky on a summer's night multiply its intensity hundreds of times and you'll have a picture of this American-German artillery duel as it flashes against the heavens. Imagine huge blast furnace doors thrown open at very frequent intervals. That is how the flickering glare of the cannonading illuminates the sky tonight when the larger guns let go.

Audacious gigantic explosions houses rocked as though shaken by a great hand, doors flew open, windows rattled violently, furniture quivered. As the American heavies fired, the departing shells could be heard on their way to the German lines. Each shell sounded like an express train leaving the railway station. Such death dealing trains halt at German stations only.

Two additional buildings were demolished by American fire at Cantigny last night. American batteries kept the enemy under heavy bombardment.

Such artillery as this starts every night at dusk and continues until after midnight. Then there is a respite until 2 or 3 o'clock in the morning, and the cannonade is resumed and lasts until dawn.

German shells arch through the air with a swish and a whistle, but the American fire is far heavier. The Americans are continuing to repair attempted German raids.

Observe Mothers' Day With the American Army in Pleadry, May 12.—Mother's Day was observed on the whole American front in France today. Thousands of letters from the United States troops to their mothers were rushed from the Pleadry sectors.
