## Signatures of Petitions Up to Attorney General

Secretary Otcott has passed another of those troublesome questions up to the state's tangle straightener, the attorney general. He asks: "What methods may the clerks adopt in arriving at a belief as to the genuineness of signatures to initiative or referendum petitions?"

Attorney General Brown replies "belief is of all shades and degrees from the slightest suspicion to the fullest assurance."

Concerning the cases where signatures have the full name on the registration books and the signature on the petitions has the initials only, or conversely, he says: "Initials only stand for names."

"If the clerk believes from similarity of writing, or from any other lawful information in his possession that the person signing the petition is in fact the same person whose name appears of record as having registered, then in such case the clerk should certify the same as genuine. However neither presumption is conclusive but is satisfactory until overcome."

He adds: "It is well, however, considering that after the first 200 names are compared for which the clerk has two days, that the clerk must compare 200 names each day, which the statutes use the word 'belief,' that it will be remembered, admits of all degrees from the slightest suspicion to fullest assurance."

## Absolutely Wheatless Bread Demonstrated

Miss Louisa Parker, our home demonstration agent, is now devoting her time to demonstrating the possibilities of potatoes and the breads that are absolutely wheatless. It is hoped that she may be able to give Salem one demonstration before this month is past. One of her favorite recipes is Potato pudding made by this prescription; and baked in a greased dish for forty-five minutes:

- 1 1/2 cup mashed potatoes.
- 4 tablespoons fat.
- 2 eggs well beaten.
- 1/2 cup milk.
- 1/4 cup teaspoon salt.
- 1/2 lemon (juice and grated rind).
- 1 tablespoon sugar.
- 1/2 cup raisins and nut meats.
