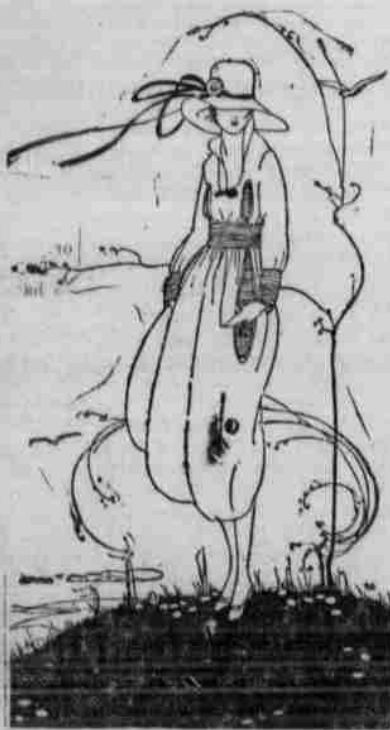

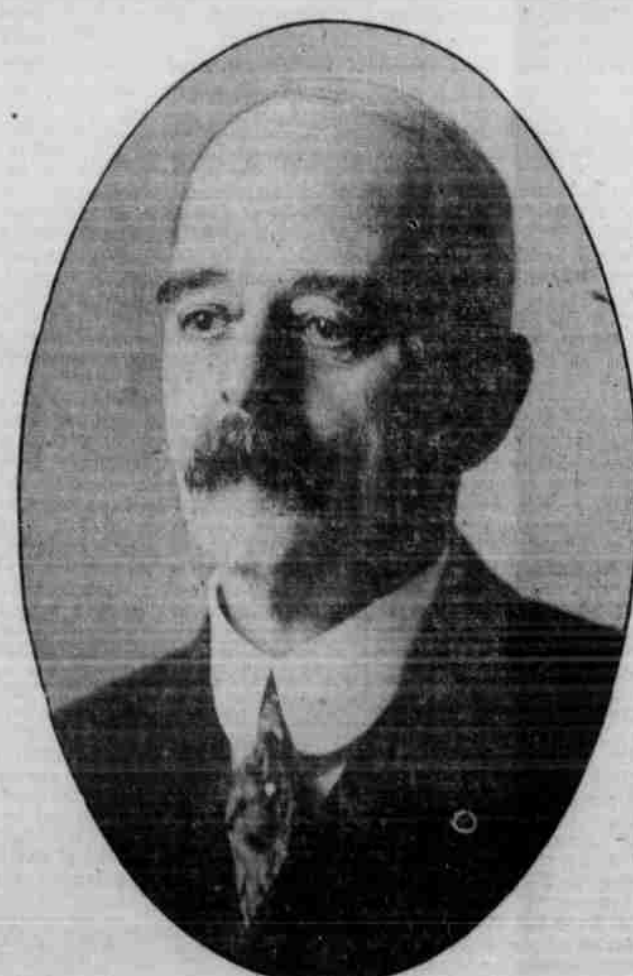

Washington, May 16.—President Wilson is going to take a week and rest from war work—and boom the Red Cross drive.

He'll leave for New York tomorrow to visit with friends there. On Saturday afternoon he will review a Red Cross parade and Saturday night formally open the Red Cross drive at the Metropolitan.

The president will remain in New York until Sunday night, taking opportunity to have a conference with Colonel House.

The president is working on his address today but will not write it, according to present plans. It is expected that he will take the opportunity offered to point out anew the latest evidences of Russian politics in the Russian invasion and the conference of the kaisers, just closed to insure a Mittel-Europe.
