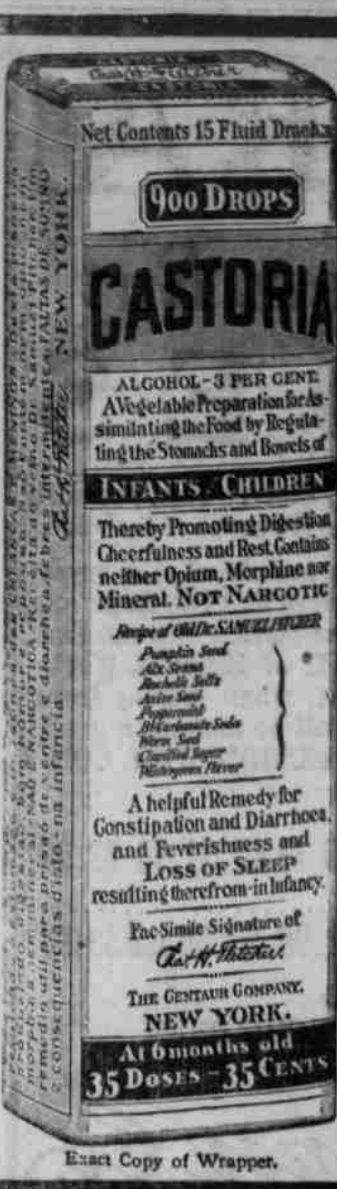

WHERE TO VOTE AT TWO ELECTIONS IN SALEM TOMORROW

Polling Places for City Election and State Primaries Are Listed

Tomorrow is the day to do your voting and according to the customs of long ago, one should vote early and often. But this is not only a state and county election, but there are several alderman to elect besides a mayor. And then the important question is coming up as to whether an alderman or a mayor should serve for two or four years.

For the city ward election, the polls are open from 8 o'clock in the morning until 8 o'clock in the evening, and for the state and county voting at the precincts the hours are exactly the same. You have twelve hours in which to vote.

For the benefit of those who are still in doubt as to where to vote the following information is given. Of course, the first thing to do is to find out in which ward one lives and then in which precinct.

Ward 1, at the Garfield school. Precinct 10 also votes here.

Ward 2, at the city hall. Precinct 16 also votes here.

Ward 3, court house and also those living in precinct 11.

Ward 4, at the vacant building second door south of Mill street on Twelfth street. Here also votes precinct 12.

Ward 5, Reddaway's store, 1421 north Sixth street. Precinct 8 also votes here.

Ward 6, Cameron's paint shop between Chemeketa and Center streets.

Ward 7, at the corner of Miller and Commercial streets. No precinct voting here.

Precinct 1, Giddings hall, one door east of Prescott's barber shop.

Precinct 2, Bungelew Christian church, Court and 17th street.

Precinct 3, Cameron's paint shop.

Precinct 4, D. R. Roble's store building, 720 south 14th street.

Precinct 5, Richmond school.

Precinct 6, Yew Park school.

IS THIS CITY LOT OR UNEVACUATED STREET

Falls City Lumber Company Raises Interesting Question of Property Title

As attorney for the Falls City-Salem Lumber Co., there was presented to the city council at a recent meeting by Smith & Shields, a petition asking the council to cancel the lien levied against property that was formerly known as Richmond avenue but which now appears to be a city lot facing on State street.

The interests of the Falls City-Salem Lumber Co. arises from the fact that the company sold the lot several years ago to Marie Bollinger, now Mrs. Gordon McGilchrist.

The story of the lot which may be technically an unvacuated street in Salem, dates back to the time about seven years ago when one Hallberg filed and recorded a plat of the Richmond addition, dedicating Richmond avenue to the public forever.

In the first plat filed, Richmond avenue, which is south of Mill creek just before it reached State street, was deflected a little to the northeast. Later Hallberg proposed that the street be continued directly to State street in a straight line and that the former plat for the street be cancelled.

From the city records it appears this was satisfactory and to follow out the plan, Hallberg deeded a small strip of land on the south side of Mill street of about one fourth acre. Later the city bought of William Burton a strip of ground 40 feet wide extending from State street southerly and connecting up on the south side of Mill street with the strip of land Hallberg had deeded to the city. This strip with the land deeded by Hallberg, opened up a direct line for Richmond avenue to State street, and part of the original street abandoned.

Thereafter the city officials seem to have regarded the original plat for the part of Richmond avenue across State street as vacated. An ordinance was passed vacating this part of Richmond avenue and on May 12 the mayor had executed and recorded a quit claim deed to Hallberg for that portion of Richmond avenue vacated.

Hallberg later sold this lot facing on State street to the Falls City Lumber Co. who again sold to the Falls City-Salem Lumber company and it was this company that sold the lot to Marie Bollinger. The assessment against the lot, \$169.49, is the amount from which the Falls City-Salem Lumber Co. wishes to be relieved, and in his communication to the council next Monday evening, city attorney H. W. May will advise that a warrant be drawn upon the general fund in an amount sufficient to cover the amount and interest.

The question will probably come before the council as to whether a street once dedicated to the use of the public can be deeded back by the city council to the original grantor and also whether the quit claim deed given in 1912 to Hallberg by the city for the vacated street will hold good in law.
