

CAMPAIGN FOR SECOND RED CROSS DRIVE FULLY ORGANIZED FOR NEXT WEEK

Thomas Kay Heads City Campaign—Organizer Page Busy in Country

'Over the top in forty-eight hours!' That is the slogan under which Salem's veteran war-fund workers will go forward on Monday morning next in the second Red Cross War Fund campaign.

The quota to be raised in Marion county is \$30,000 and in Polk county \$9,000, these two counties being combined in the drive as they are under the jurisdiction of Willamette chapter.

All arrangements preliminary to beginning the big drive on Monday are practically complete. All territory embraced by the two counties has been carefully distributed and ably manned, thanks to the zeal and leadership developed in the several similar campaigns of the recent past.

The campaign will be preceded by a special meeting for drive workers of every capacity at the First Methodist church, Salem, at 3 p. m. tomorrow. The importance of this meeting for workers cannot be over estimated and absence is equivalent to desertion or sleeping on duty. The penalties for these offenses are well known and executive clemency alone will mitigate the sentence.

Noon luncheons will be provided on Monday and Tuesday as in former drives and will be given at the First Methodist church.

One hundred million dollars is asked from the nation in this drive \$600,000 of which is allotted to Oregon. Portland will raise \$250,000 and the state outside of Portland \$350,000.

It is the ambitious determination of local drive leaders, headed by Chairman Kay and Manager Gingrich, to put Marion and Polk counties over the top in 48 hours, thus conserving for other valuable purposes the remaining two-thirds of the time officially allotted. Both the honor of such an achievement and the value of the time thus to be saved throughout the field covering two counties, constitute a mighty incentive to such a laudable endeavor.

To achieve such a result depends upon a very simple pledge each and every individual is expected to take and act upon without fail, as follows:

'I shall personally see to it that my contribution to the Red Cross War Fund is made in less than forty-eight hours from 8 o'clock, a. m., Monday May 20, 1918.'

Pledges are payable in four equal monthly payments beginning July 1 or in cash.

The local committee is meeting daily and oftener when necessary and much work of a preliminary nature is being done that will contribute largely to the success and enthusiasm of the campaign. Workers are calling up to volunteer for service and asking to be assigned specific duties.

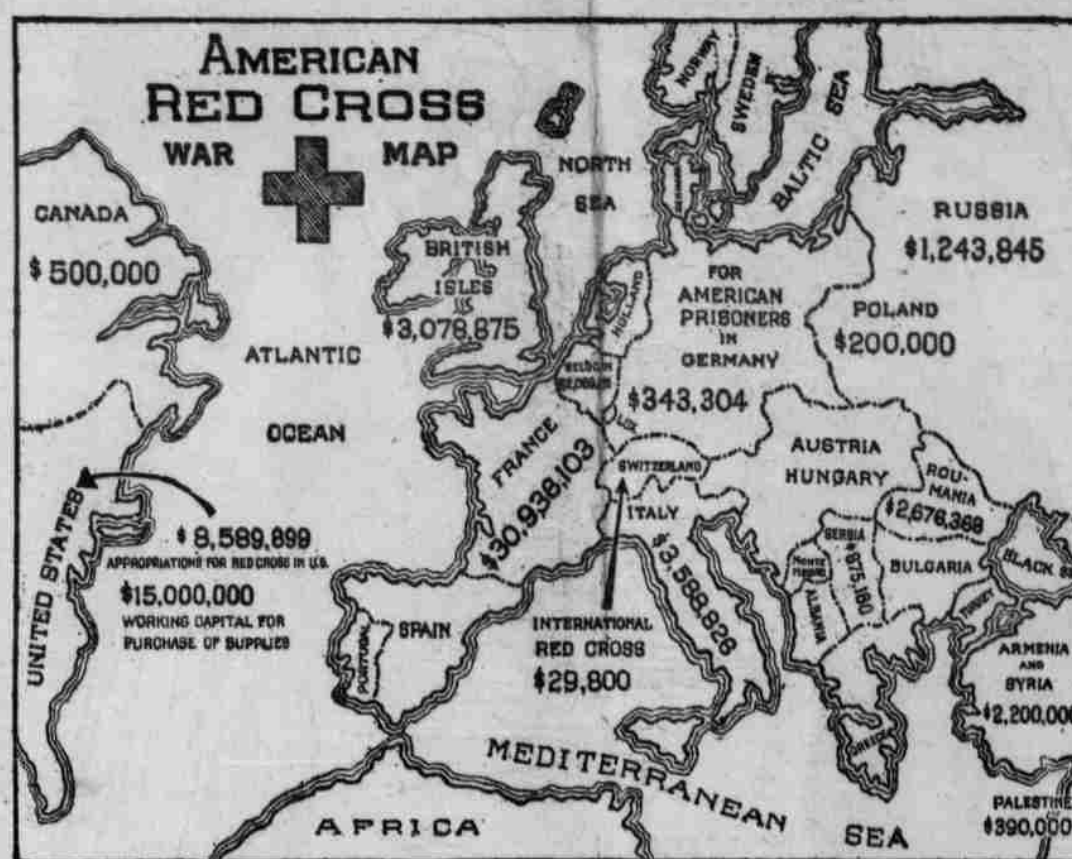
