Justice McCamant Quits Supreme Bench Soon

Justice McCamant has announced that he will resign as soon as work now on his desk is completed. He stated this morning that there was quite a lot of work ahead of him, some of it from this session at Pendleton. He is putting in eight to ten hours a day on this getting ready to go back to his home and his practice. 'It will be more than a week and less than a month,' said the jurist as a reporter from the Capital Journal tried to get the date concerned. Reading between lines it will probably be two weeks before his resignation will be filed with the governor. The governor will appoint as his successor whoever is selected for the supreme bench on the republican ticket and this, it is now evident, will be Chas. A. Johns, of Portland.

Justice McCamant was appointed by Governor Withycombe to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Justice Eakin early in 1917. It is understood that the confining character of the work on the supreme bench is one of the reasons for the resignation and another that the salary is far below what his services command in his practice. Justice McCamant stated this morning that the latter was one reason for his resignation. 'I am not necessary, not a lover of money, but circumstances are such that I simply must earn more. With two sons to put through college and some business ventures entered into since time since that have to be carried on, the salary is inadequate. This, however, he states would not carry any weight if it were not for the above conditions.'

County Superintendent of Schools Smith and Supervisors W. C. Hoppes and John W. L. Smith will go to Portland tomorrow to attend a war day conference which is called for a two day session and to which educators from all parts of the state are invited.
