LUMBER CUT INCREASING

When Will Aldermen Elect Take Their Seats

A point of law may arise as to whether the aldermen who were duly elected by receiving a majority of votes last in their wards should take their seats now or wait until January 1st.

The statutes provide that all aldermen shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified. The regular election is in November next. The city charter provides that when a candidate receives a majority of all votes cast at the primary, he shall be declared elected and shall receive his certificate of election just the same as if he had been elected in a regular election.

As seven aldermen are holding over on account of no election last fall, the question arises, does the law mean that those elected Friday take office at once or until after the general election. Also whether a primary election becomes operative at once or does it relate to the election in November and become effective after that date.
