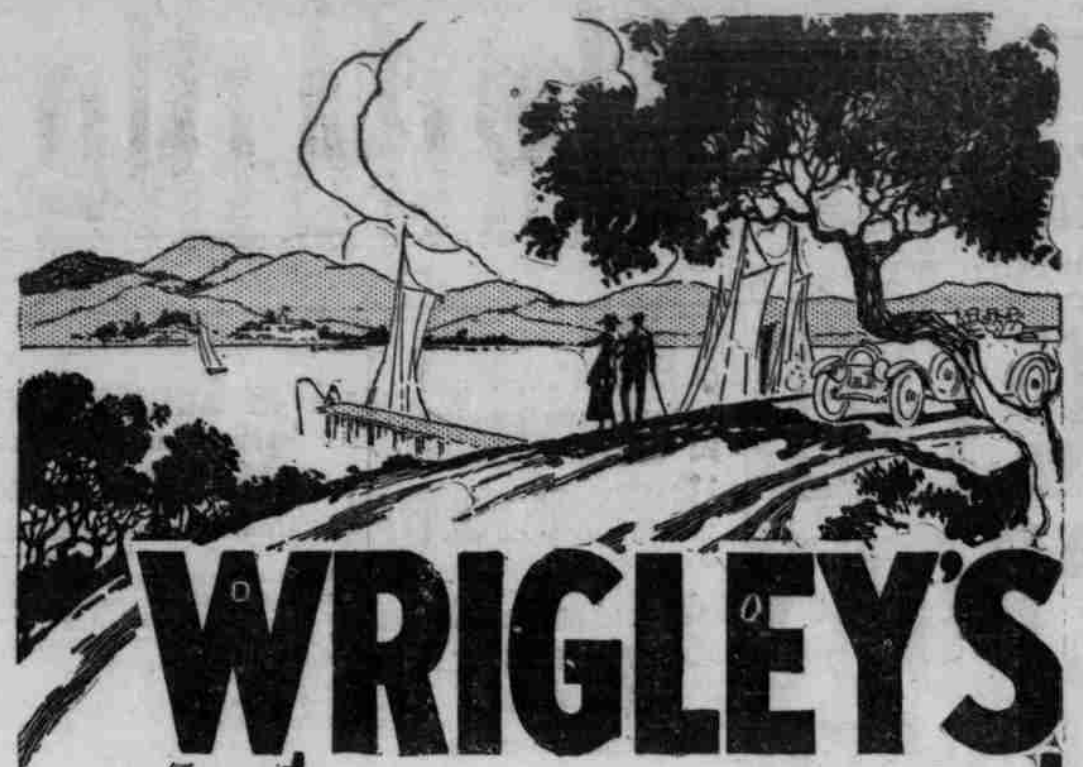

PARIS RAIDED

the night official statements.

Field Marshal Haig reported another night raid in the neighborhood of Hebuterne, in which heavy casualties were inflicted on the Germans. Yesterday morning, a second attempt of the enemy to raid British positions southeast of Meuse was repulsed. Artillery was active on other British sectors.

The French war office reported heavy artillery fire in the Thennes-Haillies sector, southeast of Amiens and south of the Avre, on the same general front. French troops took prisoners in raids southwest of Lassigny, in the Verdun sector and in Lorraine.

Heavy allied cannonading along the northern portion of the Flanders front and between Arras and Albert was reported.

Artillery Action Only

London, May 23.—German bombardment of portions of the Picardy and Flanders fronts and continued raiding operations were reported by Field Marshal Haig today.

"There was hostile artillery fire in the Ancre valley south of Lens, east of Robecq and east of the Nieppe forest during the night," the statement said.

"We carried out successful raids at Ayette, Boileux and St. Mart, inflicting casualties and capturing some machine guns.

"The enemy rushed one of our posts near Aveluy Wood last night and two of our men are missing."

State House News

The official returns from six more counties were received at the Secretary of State's office this morning. The counties heard from are Baker, Morrow, Gilliam, Yamhill, Lincoln and Crook. These with Sherman and Hood River heard from previously brings the number up to eight.

The Beaver Portland Cement company has asked the Public Service commission for higher rates to southern Oregon points, and a hearing has been set for June 10.

State Highway Commissioner Booth and Engineer Nunn left Eugene this morning for a trip into Curry county. The federal government and the state have set aside \$50,000 for improving the Coast Highway and it is to give this the once-over and get an idea of what work is needed, and where it should be done that the officials are making the trip.

The Richardson Gap Cheese company filed articles of incorporation this morning. Its principal place of business is Richardson Gap, its capital stock \$2,000 and its object to conduct a cheese factory on the co-operative plan.

EX-BANKER WILL BE TRIED

Eugene, Or., May 23.—The case of State vs. Jess Fox, Harry Martin and Elmer D. Paine has been set for trial in the Lane county circuit court during the term beginning June 3. The defendants are charged with burning a warehouse at Coburg belonging to the Eugene Mill & Elevator Company, for the purpose of defrauding insurance companies. The building was destroyed together with 4000 sacks of potatoes last February.

The case has attracted unusual interest in view of the prominence of Paine, who was formerly the cashier of the United States National Bank, in Eugene and who is one of the partners in the business of the Eugene Mill & Elevator Company.
