All Enemy-Aliens Must Secure Special Control

The following notice has been posted in the lobby of the Salem post office:

"All German alien enemies are hereby informed that by proclamation of the president of the United States, it is unlawful for any native, citizen, denizen or subject of the German empire or of the imperial German government, being males of the age of fourteen years and upwards who are with in the United States and not fully naturalized as American citizens, to approach or be found within a half mile of any federal or state fort, camp, arsenal, aircraft station, government or naval vessel, navy yard, factory or workshop for the manufacture of munitions of war, or any products for the use of the army or navy or of the United States without first having secured, from the United States marshal in the district in which they reside, a permit so to do in compliance with instructions heretofore issued by the United States department of justice." A permit to approach within half a mile of the armory will be granted aliens by the United States marshal who will be at the Salem police headquarters two days, June 7 and 8. The notice also adds: "All German aliens who fail to secure these permits will thereafter be liable to summary arrest and internment during the period of the war." The notice is signed by G. F. Alexander, United States marshal, district of Oregon.

Spruce Mill Burned and Arrests Will Follow

Hoquiam Wash., May 24.—Positive evidence of incendiarism in the destruction of the Northwestern Lumber company's sawmill, which is engaged almost exclusively in cutting airplane spruce for the government, was found today.

A carbide lamp was found under the mill, with tracks of a man leading to the lamp. Three trails branched from the lamp leading to points beneath the big plant. One arrest has been made and others will follow today. Federal agents say they have evidence that German agents were sent here from all parts of the country to cripple the airplane spruce production industry. One German alien enemy, August Rattener, jumped here from New Orleans and went to work at once for the Northwestern Mill. He is still held by federal officers.
