Pacific Division Doubles Red Cross War Fund

San Francisco, May 29.--The Pacific division of the Red Cross probably will have doubled its Red Cross subscription fund when all the money is counted, it was indicated today.

Total subscriptions at noon were \$6,502,083.91. Of this amount California has contributed \$5,915,539.19; Arizona, \$450,191.81 and Nevada, \$106,356.89. Final figures will not be ready for several days.

According to reports from the banks, fully 90 per cent of those who subscribed for the Third Liberty loan on the government plan are paying up pretty close to schedule time, which was yesterday. The next payment, one of 35 per cent will be due July 15, when those subscribing for a \$50 bond will pay \$17.50, and on a \$100 bond, \$35 and in proportion. The final payment is in August.

IRRIGATION FOR 1918

For the purpose of trying to make the irrigation service more satisfactory the city will be divided into two districts so that each district will get the full service of the plant upon the day it irrigates.

The plan is to have the houses which bear even numbers on the streets irrigate only on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday, and the houses which bear odd numbers on the streets irrigate only on Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday. This plan will permit every house to irrigate four days out of each week.

The purpose of the Water company in furnishing water for irrigation is not to furnish all the water a person can run through the hose in the six irrigation hours every day, but to furnish enough water to keep the lawn in condition.
