Campbell pursued the enemy machine until its pilot had expended all his ammunition. Then he dived at his opponent and brought him down inside the American lines.

Lieutenant Eddie Biekenbacher, of Columbus, Ohio, also has five victories to his credit, as the result of his Tuesday's victory but cannot be recognized as an ace until he is officially credited with his last victim.

twenty of the enemy were killed and wounded. A machine gun was captured.

Perishing's communique, a supplement to last night's report, said: "The fact is now established that at least four distinct counter attacks on our new positions near Cantigny were made before noon May 30.

"The enemy airplane referred to as being brought down in the communique of May 31, was an Albatross biplane shot down at 1,500 meters by Lieutenant Douglas Campbell in the region north of Toul. Both pilot and observer were killed.

"In the Woerre, in the early morning of May 31 a raid on the German line was carried out by volunteers and reinforced detachments. The raiding party blew up thirty two dugouts and a
