WILLAMETTE CHAPTER TO DEDICATE THE NEW INTER-COUNTY BRIDGE

Chairman H. W. Meyers
Names Committee to Plan
Red Cross Program

At the last meeting of the Willamette Chapter of the Red Cross, its chairman was instructed to appoint a committee to act as a central body to work out a plan for the dedication of the inter-county bridge, which it is expected will be completed not later than July 15. The county courts of Marion and Polk counties will do all in their power to make the celebration a success and the intent is to make it a day of jubilation for all in Marion and Polk counties and especially those who use the bridge to a greater or lesser extent. It will appeal strongly to the residents of Polk county residing in its eastern part and to Salemites, who have always found the drives over the rolling Polk county hills especially attractive. This is one of Salem's scenic routes, one sure to be shown visitors, and always enjoyable no matter how often traveled over. The occasion will be in the nature of a big celebration and general jubilation, taking the place of the Cherry Fair and also of the Fourth of July. This will do away with the merchants and others contributing to these events, and permit using whatever funds are collected in celebrating the opening of the new bridge. The plans are broad enough to interest every resident of the two counties and it will be the biggest celebration ever pulled off in Salem. The details will be published later and the date fixed as soon as that of the completion of the bridge is known. Marion and Polk county folks should watch out for the date, for the completion of the bridge is one of the most important events to the counties and the celebration will be made in accordance with that importance.

Chairman Henry W. Meyers today announced the executive committee to have charge of the celebration as follows: Chairman Frank T. Wrightman, Charles R. Archer, W. H. Hamilton, Henry Dancy, and Dr. Starbuck of Dallas.

The temporary bridge now in use across the Willamette at Salem will go again into active duty late this fall across the Cowlitz river in Washington as a small town named Riffe in Lewis county, 40 miles east of Chehalis. The present span of the Salem bridge is 390 feet but it will be cut to 270 feet to accommodate the Cowlitz. The bridge is owned by the contracting company constructing the new bridge.

F. G. Delano and A. I. Eoff will go to Portland tomorrow with automobile drivers, who will return to Salem with a car load of Chevrolet cars. This method of getting cars Mr. Delano has found to be quicker and also relieves the freight congestion to some extent.
