W. F. Woodard, of the well known drug firm of Clark and Woodard, Portland, has accepted the invitation to address the annual meeting of the Salem Commercial club on the evening of June 21. Mr. Woodard has come into considerable prominence lately in Portland on account of his patriotic stands on several occasions.

The Mehama and Lyons Red Cross auxiliaries will hold a joint celebration on July 4, on the camping grounds at Lyons. These grounds are about one and one-half hours drive from Salem and four hours from Portland and a distance of 27 miles from Albany. It is expected to make this celebration a big event and those interested might write to B. F. Berringer, S. D. Brown, E. A. Taylor, or W. F. Harrison all of Lyons.

Mr. R. L. Swarts, who has a farm four miles east of the city brought some samples of flax to the Capital Journal office today that show fine growth and give promise of a bountiful yield. The stalks are a rich deep healthy green and are twenty inches in length. It is as fine a sample as has come to the city since flax cultivation began to be agitated and shows what can be done with proper cultivation and an understanding of the soil conditions necessary for flax growing.

"Everybody work" is getting to be the motto now-a-days, and for those who want work, there is plenty of opportunities at the Hunt Bros. cannery. The strawberry season is coming on next week and the cannery is in need of help, especially as schools will not be closed until the middle of the month. The work is done on the piece rate plan and an average worker can make from \$2 to \$2.50 a day. There will be more help available after the schools are out for next week, the middle of the strawberry season, there is a shortage of labor, especially that which can be done by women.

The vacation privilege which the public library grants to its patrons each summer is open from June 15 to October 1, this year. Any adult patron may borrow as many as four fiction and two non-fiction books and retain them until October, providing only that the books be of less popular ones. Pay fiction will not be included in this privilege; the popularity of other books will be decided upon by the librarians. With these provisions the library invites the public to use this opportunity, to read during the summer some of the books which the busier winter months do not leave time for.

In order to properly observe the total eclipse, E. T. Barnes has arranged a party to leave Saturday morning about five o'clock for Castle Rock, Wash., about 70 miles beyond Portland. This point is especially of advantage in noting the shadow of the moon sweeping across the face of the earth. In the party besides Mr. Barnes will be Superintendent John H. Todd, Prof. Herman Clark of the high school, Professor Matthews of Willamette University, Ralph Barnes, Phillips Elliott and Kenneth Powers.

Sheriff W. I. Needham, who returned today with Ernest Blue from Ketchikan, Alaska, says that the town is a thriving one of about 3,000 and that business appears to be thriving, as the fishermen are receiving good prices for their fish. He noted that at this time of the year the climate was not materially different from this part of Oregon. The distance from Seattle to Ketchikan is about 660 miles and Mr. Needham made the return trip on the steamer Prince Albert in three days. In the town of 3,000, he says there are only four lawyers and that the legal profession seems to be thriving. The matter of furnishing bond for Mr. Blue came up this afternoon in the circuit court, and he was released on \$5,000 bond. It is understood that he intends to fight the case against him.

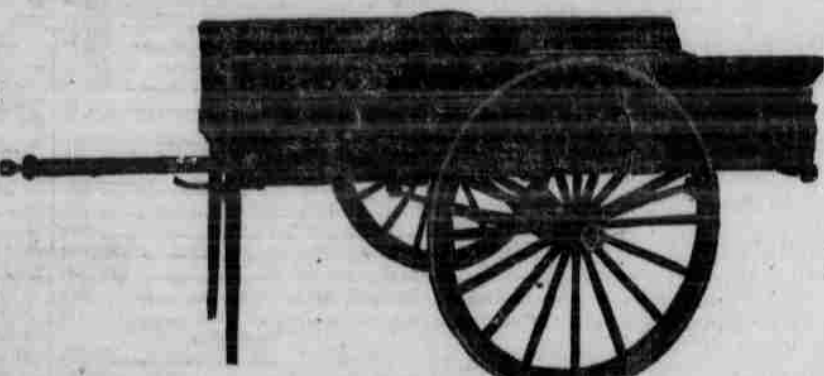
