Court House News

In the suit of Edjilmer Erickson against W. S. Mott, defendant filed his answer setting up that the promissory note for which the plaintiff brings suit, it being in the sum of \$2,500, was void and of no value on account of it having been obtained under duress, and that there was no consideration for the same. To this plaintiff replies that he contracted to purchase certain lands of defendant, and that because defendant could not convey title, plaintiff lost what money he had expended on the land and that defendant admitted his liability for the loss and that it was to secure payment for this liability that defendant gave the note sued on.

The Oregon Motor Car Company against G. W. Senn, is a suit to recover possession of a motor truck of the alleged value of \$2000 or if this cannot be had, then for \$2,000 as the value thereof and for \$100 attorney fees.

In the matter of the Alliance Trust company versus Hubbard, the receiver filed his report for May showing cash received \$1,383.31 and cash on hand over and above all expenditures, \$819.31.

State of Oregon versus Ernest Blue, was continued to the November term.

In the suit of Marie Hallberg, an order extending the time for perfecting the appeal, to July 10 was made.

In the matter of the estate of Ellen M. White, deceased, the final account of the administrator W. M. Coburn was filed.

Petitions for an initiative measure will be passed around Salem next week for signatures. The measure proposed for the raising of a \$1,000,000 war fund by a tax of one mill each year until the close of the war. The money is to be used for maintaining the state police the erection of hospitals as needed for returning soldiers and any work that may be required as a direct effect of the war. The fund is to be administered by the Board of Control and at the close of the war all unexpended funds are to go into the irrevocable school funds. The measure has the approval of the state attorney general and other state officials.

Just when the men in class one will be exhausted is becoming a matter of interest to many a married man in this community. The records of the local exemption board show that about 2,000 men of draft age have registered in class 1 and to this will be added 123 registering June 5. Although but 55 men will leave June 24, the call was for 177. After the 177 have been inducted into the service, the order numbers will have reached 1770. This leaves from board No. 1, at Salem, 453 men to be called before class 1 is exhausted, but of course this number will not be available as many of the latest registrants will volunteer or be exempt from several causes. Hence at a conservative estimate, it appears that after the present call for 177 men has been filled, there will be about 350 more available men left in class 1.

KIMBALL SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY HOLDS ANNUAL EXERCISES

Commencement Program In Assembly Hall Yesterday Afternoon

The commencement exercises of the Kimball school of Theology were held in the Kimball Hall of Assembly Friday June 7, at 2:30 p. m. A large attendance greeted the occasion. Many friends of the institution and of the students coming from out of town to be present. Dr. F. W. Chace played the processional as the faculty, graduating class and participants marched in. Dr. Wm. Wallace Younger of Portland offered the prayer. Dr. Geo. H. Alden of Willamette University read the scripture. The Kimball chorus sang Dr. Buell's divinity hymn, "Give Tongues of Fire to Preach Thy Word." Bishop Matthew Simpson Hughes, D. D., L. L. D. delivered the commencement address. This was a virile presentation of world conditions and the part the church and the ministry are called upon to perform in order to meet these tremendous opportunities. The address sparkled with wit and

thrilled with patriotism, while it vibrated with an unquenchable optimism as to the future.

President Henry J. Talbott, D. D. gave the charge to the graduating class in which he emphasized in a striking way the vital things in a preacher's message. Mr. F. S. Burton sang, "All Ye Who Seek," in his strong, yet tender way.

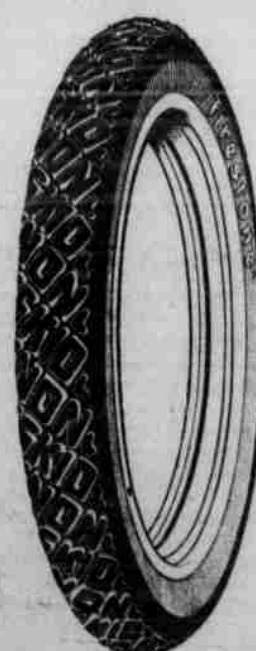
Dr. Talbott, with some appreciative words presented the diploma to the graduates, Mr. Thos. Acheson, and Prof. Hammond, on behalf of the institution, gave to Mr. Acheson the Stone Scholarship Medal, saying that the recipient had made an average of more than 90 per cent in his grades during his four years of study in the school. Mr. Acheson has been pastor at various points near Salem in the last four years, including Hubbard, Marquam, Glad Tidings and Fargo. Friends from these places were interested visitors on commencement day.

Dr. Talbott announced during the exercises the change in the official title of the school from The Kimball College of Theology to the Kimball School of Theology. This change is made in harmony with the request of the Board of Education of the Church which wishes the title College reserved for Liberal Arts Schools only. He also stated that the past year has been the best year in the history of the school from the standpoint of numbers, thirty-six having been enrolled during the year.
