PRESIDENT WILSON GENERALLY APPROVED

London Editor Calls Him "Architect of World's Future" In Comment

London, June 11.—The London press unanimously approves President Wilson's speech to Mexican journalists.

"President Wilson has revealed himself as the architect of the world's future," the Daily News said. "The loyalty of the United States to Russia, from which it has nothing to gain, is one of the redeeming episodes of the war. When history is written Wilson will shine like a beacon light in the darkness."

"President Wilson's internationalism is so far away from national jealousies and distrust that it seems like an unattainable dreamland," said the Daily Express. "However, it is a bridge that can be entered with faith. It is something that Wilson's creed has been accepted by the most vigorous and hardest headed people on earth."

"Great Britain and the United States together can exert an equalled economic pressure on the enemy and compel the enemy to come around to our ideas of culture, peace and world liberty," the Chronicle said.

"It is the only basis upon which an enduring peace can be founded," the Graphic declared.

President's Address

Washington, June 11.—Pan-Americanism, a part of all the Americas for self-protective purposes, is advocated by President Wilson.

This developed today with the authorized publication of President Wilson's recent address to a group of Mexican editors visiting here.

Declaring the Monroe doctrine to be a case of telling Central America "we are going to be a big brother to you whether you want us to be or not," the president said the policy contained nothing that protects Mexico from "aggression from us."

As a result the president declared, he had observed some sister republics to the south were uneasy lest "our self appointed protection (Monroe doctrine) might be for our own benefit and our own interest and not for the interest of our neighbors."

He then revealed that he had proposed to the countries "a common guarantee that all of us will sign a declaration of political independence and territorial integrity."

Such an arrangement, he said, "will have to be the foundation of the future life of the nations of the world. The whole family of nations will have to guarantee to each nation that no nation shall violate its political independence or its territorial integrity. That is the only conceivable basis for the future peace of the world and I must admit I was anxious to have the states of the two continents of America show the way to the rest of the world as to how to make a basis of peace."

"Peace can only come by trust. If you can once get a situation of trust, then you have got a situation of permanent peace. Therefore, everyone of us, it seems to me, owes it as a patriotic duty to his own country to plant the seeds of confidence and trust, instead of suspicion."

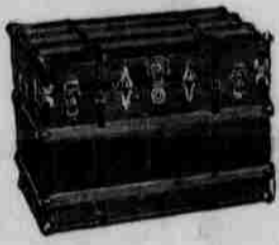

He declared the administration's policy was that "the international settlement of internal affairs of Mexico thirteen of our battleships had been sunk off the coasts of the Chesapeake. You see how dreadful it is to have people so radically misinformed. It was added that our navy department was withholding the truth with regard to these sinkings. I have no doubt that the publisher of the paper published that in perfect innocence without intending to convey wrong impressions, but it is evident that allegations of that sort proceed from those who wish to make trouble between Mexico and the United States." "Now, for the time being at any rate, I hope it will not be a short time, the influence of the United States is somewhat pervasive in the affairs of the world and I believe that it is per-herself."
