HURLED BACK

South of the Villers-Cotterets forest there was intermittent fighting clear to the environs of Chateau-Thierry, adding a 25 mile fighting area to the main battle zone.

On the Oise front, the French continued to progress slightly on the west, while the enemy made further progress on the east, it was indicated by last night's official statements.

The French war office reported further progress in the region of Belloy wood and St. Maur, with the capture of four hundred additional prisoners and a quantity of material. There was no change on the front from St. Maur to Antheuil.

Official admission of retirement from the sharp Noyon salient was made in the Paris communique. The French line was voluntarily withdrawn on Monday to the line of Bailly and Tracy-Le-Val, joining the Marne battle front east of Naupel. This represents a retirement to a maximum depth of about four miles.

North of the Marne allied troops occupied Montecourt, two miles southwest of Chateau-Thierry and the southern portion of Bussaries, seven miles northwest of Chateau-Thierry.

The German war office described the French evacuation of the Noyon salient as having been "forced" by loss of the heights southwest of Noyon. Thirteen thousand additional prisoners are claimed.

Referring to the fighting north of the Marne, Berlin said: "Obstinately and regardless of sacrifices, the enemy kept up his vain attacks northwest of Chateau-Thierry. Several assaults were broken down with sanguinary losses."

Field Marshal Haig reported a successful raid near Loivre, on the Flanders front, by French troops last night. The Italian was office reported successful patrol operations and the repulse of Austrian raids.

General Haig Reports

London, June 13.—Successful local operations in Flanders and a British raid near Arras were reported by Field Marshal Haig today.

"Local operations were conducted successfully last night southwest of Meris and east of Dieckbusch lake," the statement said.

"In the former sector we advanced our line a little and took a number of prisoners. In the latter sector the French improved their positions in the neighborhood of the ridge wood and took thirty prisoners."

portion of the new Oise front, have destroyed 29 enemy airplanes since the drive started last Saturday, it was officially announced by the war office today. In the same period they have dropped 21 tons of bombs.

Operating on the Picardy front, British airmen shot down two enemy machines, dove two others down out of control and dropped 18 tons of bombs, badly damaging the railway at Cambrai and the billets at Framcourt. One British machine is missing.

Civilians Leave Compiegne

Paris, June 13.—The civilian evacuation of Compiegne has been completed, it was officially announced today. Thousands of refugees are arriving on special trains.

Use Five Divisions

Paris, June 13.—The Germans yesterday used five divisions (60,000) against the Aisne and the Forest de Villers-Cotterets, the Exchange Telegraph correspondent declared today. "Their losses are estimated at 20,000."

IRRIGATION FOR 1918

For the purpose of trying to make the irrigation service more satisfactory the city will be divided into two districts so that each district will get the full service of the plant upon the day it irrigates.

The plan is to have the houses which bear even numbers on the streets irrigate only on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday, and the houses which bear odd numbers on the streets irrigate only on Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday. This plan will permit every house to irrigate four days out of each week.

The purpose of the Water company in furnishing water for irrigation is not to furnish all the water a person can run through the hose in the six irrigation hours every day, but to furnish enough water to keep the lawn in condition. 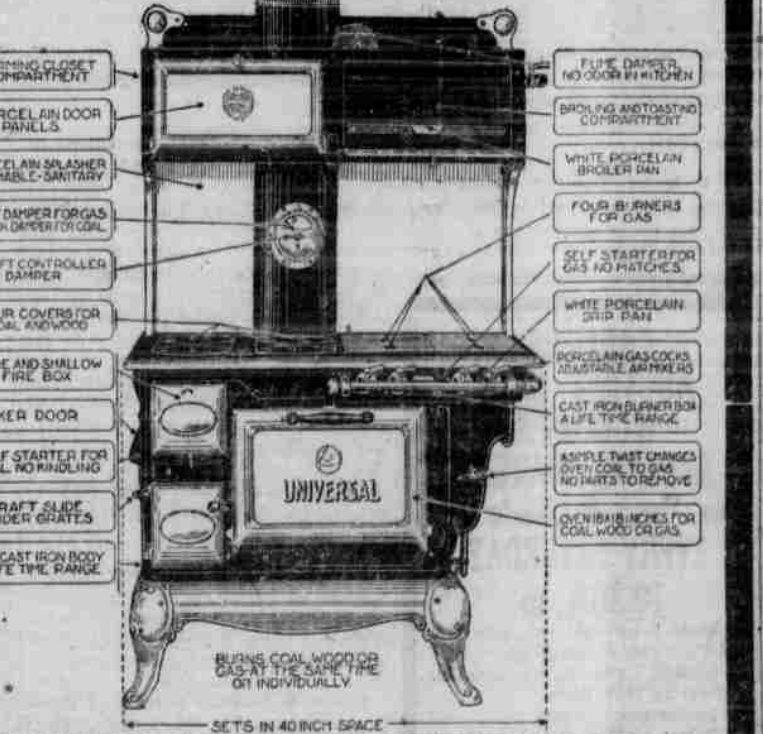
