Methodist Young People Pick Cherries Sundays

The Live Wires, a class of young married people and mature young people of the Sunday school of Leslie M. E. church, under the supervision and direction of their president and teacher, A. C. Bohrastedt, will go to the Kimball orchards to pick cherries Saturday afternoon and all day Sunday. This will be repeated the two following week ends, or so long as there are cherries to pick. The class consists of nearly 50 young people, many of whom are already away at work for the summer, but the balance of the class who are employed during the week, will show their patriotism and Christian spirit by foregoing their usual day of rest and engage in the most important work of the time—helping to conserve food for their boys at the front, our allies and the starving peoples of Europe. It is expected that 30 or more will go.

Grace Lusk Sentenced to Nineteen Years

Waukegan, Wis., June 18.—Grace Lusk at 4:10 p. m. was sentenced to 19 years in the state penitentiary at Waupun for the murder of Mrs. Mary Newman Roberts, June 21, 1917. She fought but rallied quickly. She was found sane by Judge Martin Leuck this afternoon and two motions for a new trial interposed by the defense were overruled and denied. The court then heard arguments on sentence.

Registering Woman of Alien Nationality

The work of registering all alien women above the age of 14 years is progressing slowly, as yesterday but one registered from the rural districts at the post office and only five from Salem at the police station. The registering will continue until the evening of Wednesday June 26. Besides the finger and hand prints, each registrant is obliged to have four photographs taken, which are filed with the registration papers. At the police station the following alien women registered yesterday: Anna Bahrborg, 1650 north Fifth street; Annie Demongell, 253 north 13th street; Marie Resch, at the Oregon state tuberculosis hospital; Louise Abraham, 665 south 19th street; Mary Zeilke, 1299 Saginaw street. Miss Alta Patterson, one of the teachers in the McKinley school the past year, is assisting in the work at the police station.
