



CAMP LEWIS TO HAVE NEW COMMANDER

General Greene Relieved of Command May Get Command of Philippines

Tacoma, Wash., June 20.—With Major General H. A. Greene relieved of command of the 21st division and on his way to Washington, D. C., to report to the war department, officers at Camp Lewis were dumfounded today at the sudden and unexpected change that deprived the entombment of its commander.

It is stated that General Greene is returning to his full rank of brigadier general in the regular army and that he will be given command of the department of the Philippines at Manila. Brigadier General Foltz is in temporary command of Camp Lewis.

Growers May Skip Spray In Regular Schedules

O. A. C. Experiment Station, Corvallis, June 20.—Because scab and brown rot have had but little opportunity to develop this year on account of weather unfavorable to these diseases, many growers have been able to omit the regular 10-day spray for apples and pears and the June spray for stone fruits. The season opened with minimum infection and the dry spring, has made it hard for scab and brown rot to make headway.

Turning Millions Into Federal Treasury Now

Washington, June 20.—Internal revenue collectors today remitted approximately \$500,000 to the treasury, derived from income and excess profits taxes. Returns from these two sources so far have netted about \$1,350,000,000. Payments on the third liberty loan today reached \$2,218,000,000, leaving about \$1,000,000,000 unpaid.
