### ANNUAL MEETING OF COMMERCIAL CLUB THIS EVENING

Reports of Year's Work Will  
Be Heard and W. F.  
Woodward Will Speak

At the annual meeting of the Com- mercial club to be held this evening in the auditorium of the club rooms, Pres- ident Fred W. Steusloff will deliver his annual address and acting Manager R. S. Gill will submit his report as to the activities of the club during the past year.

Besides the regular work of the club which includes the business of the Sa- lem Business Men's League, there has been an unusual amount of detail work done through the war activities.

All departments, including the food administration of the federal govern- ment have been acting through the Commercial club and this has aided greatly to the clerical work of the of- fice.

In his report this evening Mr. Gill will tell of the work done by the club regarding the vital matter of crossing the river after the old bridge was of- ficially closed and of its efforts in se- curing the new bridge.

Several industries have come to Sa- lem during the past year whereby Sa- lem has had an increased pay roll, so greatly needed when so many people were being called to active work in the larger cities.

One of the most important matters of the past year has been the work the Commercial club has done in connec- tion with the liberty loans co-operating with the various committees. Also the co-operation of the club in the Red Cross campaigns.

For the women, the auditorium has been remodeled including the building of a stage. Since this work has been done the Woman's club has affiliated with the Commercial club and all its meetings have been held in the club auditorium.

Other important affairs of the club will be told in the address to be de- livered this evening by R. S. Gill, acting manager and by President Fred W. Steusloff, president of the Commercial club.

This evening there will be elected a president of the club for the coming year and also directors of the seven departments.

W. F. Woodward, of Portland, will be present on invitation and address the members.

Following the business session there will be a smoker and buffet luncheon.

### AUSTRIANS CORNERED BY FLOODED RIVER AND ITALIAN TROOPS

Large Numbers Cut Off Are  
Expected to Surrender to  
Victorious Army

Washington, June 21.—A large part of the Austrian army has been cornered between the flooded Piave and the ad- vancing Italian troops in the Montello; the British war office reports today stated.

The Italians have established their former lines at virtually all points from the Montello to the sea and are making gains in the mountains above the Montello.

Destruction of the bridges, either by artillery or the floods, has blocked all chance of the Austrians to extricate themselves, it is believed here and sur- render of large numbers is expected mo- mentarily.

The Italians reported the recapture of a large number of guns abandoned ear- ly in the drive.
