FIRST BIG MEETING IS STAMP CAMPAIGN SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Judge S. A. Lovell and A. L. Mills Will Be Principal Speakers

Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock the people of Salem are invited to attend the first big meeting of the War Savings Stamps campaign to be held at the armory at 3 o'clock. The active work of securing pledges will begin Monday morning.

The lower floor of the armory will be reserved for the 600 or more active workers who have each been assigned to a certain team under charge of a captain. Working districts will be assigned and each of the 600 workers are expected to begin active canvassing Monday morning.

Having already sold War Saving Stamps to the value of \$70,000 or more, Salem's quota remains at \$250,000 and the team captains have instructions to keep their men in the field until this amount has been pledged. The campaign in the rural districts will also start tomorrow and close with mass meetings at the rural school houses Friday evening June 28.

The two speakers for Sunday afternoon are both men of prominence. Judge Lovell of Pendleton is regarded as one of the strong men of that part of the state and wrote that he was glad that he could be of service since gray hairs prevented a more active participation. A. L. Mills, president of the First National Bank of Portland, is one of the leading financiers of the state and besides that, a most interesting speaker.

In order that the campaign may start right, there has been formed a "500" club of men who agreed to buy \$500 worth of stamps. It is expected that at least 20 men will be found in Salem who will buy this amount. A committee was appointed to secure members of the "500" club and already report the following names: Jos. H. Albert, E. T. Barnes, C. P. Bishop, R. P. Boise, Wm. Brown, A. N. Bush, W. H. Eldridge, D. W. Eyre, Dan J. Fry, Kay Woolen Mills, H. W. Meyers, Hal D. Patton, Salem Bank of Commerce, Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, F. W. Steusloff and Vick Bros. The committee to secure members of the "500" club include Wm. Brown, Hal D. Patton and R. P. Boise.

No pledges will be taken at the meeting tomorrow afternoon no. subscriptions asked. The meeting is held that all may have a clearer view of the needs of the government for funds necessary to carry on the war and also details as to the War Savings stamps campaign.
