The president will inform congress of his purpose—possibly in a formal address to that body. He already has conferred with congressional leaders on the question. His Fourth of July speech at Mount Vernon will hold out the hand of aid to Russia as well as other nationalities now under German domination the present world is rendered doubly difficult by the confession reports from Russia. The only certain thing about the situation there is the increasing chaos. If the bolsheviks are overthrown, however, the allies are now definitely enough together in their plans to offer assistance to any stable government established. The Germans, it is known, are preparing to gain control of such government before the allies can move.

England believes if an American army should be put into Russia, even though it were only 100,000 men or less, it would serve as a rallying point for the Slavs. As it moved on it would gain recruits; and its very presence would stimulate the Russians to align themselves again. Backed by other allied forces, a powerful army

could be built, say British sources. The United States general staff, however, fears supply and transport problems make despatch of any great American force almost impossible. Staff officers believe Russia must be redeemed from within, and that economic aid from the United States and the allies would be the surest means of re-establishing the east front.

Without attempting to pass upon the diplomatic phases of Japanese intervention army men declare Japan and China, as the nearest man power sources, would be the logical military aid for Russia.

GERMANS SAY CZAR DEAD

(United Press staff correspondent) Stockholm, June 29.—The German embassy at Moscow confirms the murder of Nicholas Romanoff, former czar according to a dispatch received here. The Nasse-Slava declares that persons arriving in Moscow from Ekaterinburg state that when the Czech Slovaks advanced on the latter city, red guards went to the former emperor's mansion and ordered the whole family to prepare to leave on a special train. While en route to the station, Nicholas heatedly protested against transfer to an unknown place

whereupon the red guard escort bayoneted him.

The former empress and her daughters were not molested. The former carevitch was taken to a separate, unknown place. Countess Brassova, wife of Grand Duke Michael, was imprisoned in Butir penitentiary in Moscow.

The perilous bolshevik alliance with Germany will be greater than ever if the allies invade Siberia.

"If forced to choose between the evils of German and Japanese orientation, we prefer the former, because there is a chance of a revolution in Germany," War Minister Trotsky declared in a speech at Moscow this week.

Situation Desperate

Paris, June 29.—A dispatch to the Matin from Helsingfors today declared that the Russian situation is desperate. Red guards are patrolling Petrograd at night, firing on pedestrians. Hundreds are dying of hunger every day.

Germans Ready to Act

Zurich, June 29.—German newspapers declare the government is preparing for military intervention in Russia, "to restore order." The Russian maximalists will assist, they claim.

HOUSE VOTES MORE BONDS

Washington, June 29.—The house today authorized issuance of \$8,000,000,000 more in liberty bonds. The treasury now has authority to issue a total of \$20,000,000,000 in bonds. The bill also provides an additional \$1,500,000,000 for loans to the allies.

CANDY MANUFACTURER PLANNING EDUCATIONAL ADVERTISING CAMPAIGN

To Tell Public the Truth About the Candy Situation Due to War Conditions

The candy makers of Oregon are planning to tell the general public the facts about the candy industry and about the candy industry and about candy as a food product. Due to much misunderstanding and to a lack of a definite knowledge of the facts, the candy industry has been brought to the verge of collapse. Ask the average man or woman how much sugar goes into the making of candy and you will find that it is the general opinion that all the way from 25 to 50 per cent goes into candy making. But this is not correct. Far from using 25 to 50 per cent, the candy industry uses something less than 8 per cent of the sugar used in this country.

Even if the entire amount were cut off from candy making, the sugar situation would not be greatly relieved. The candy makers contend that all should share alike in the saving of sugar. They have already given until it hurts. There is no more patriotic body of men than the men in the candy business and they have gladly given up their supplies but they now feel that the interests of the country call for a definite knowledge of the facts. People must realize that the candy industry alone can not save enough sugar to solve the problem. Many people, without knowing the facts, have felt that candy could be curtailed and the problem solved. But show that the place to save sugar where it really counts is in the home, from now on. Figures show that out of the 84 pounds normally used by each person in the United States in one year, less than 7 pounds are used in candy while 60 pounds are used in the home on the table. The saving of ten per cent in the home is nearly equal to the saving of 100 per cent in the candy industry. Candy makers believe that a fairminded public, with these facts in mind, will be willing to help share the strain to the end that the big industry built up through many years can survive and go through without further curtailment as the curtailment now is coming to the point where the future of the industry is looked to with fear.

It is believed by the candy makers that as the general public comes to learn of the high food value of candy and also realizes the lengths to which the industry has already gone that relief will not be withheld. The series of advertisements is the method of expression selected by the candy makers as a means to enable them to get the full facts before the public.

RUSSELLITE CONVICTED

Seattle, Wash., June 29.—Frank Shaffer, of Everett, a rancher, and assistant business manager of the International Bible Students association, was found guilty in the United States federal district court here today of violating the espionage act by circulating volume seven of Pastor Russell's book "The Finished Mystery." The jury deliberated 17 hours before it was able to reach a verdict.

FAKE WAR WORKERS

New York, June 29.—Fakers claiming to be collecting for war charities gathered more than \$2,000,000 in New York during the last year, according to figures presented to the grand jury by District Attorney Swann. In its presentment today the jury denounced war relief imposters and recommended a federal controller for war charities.

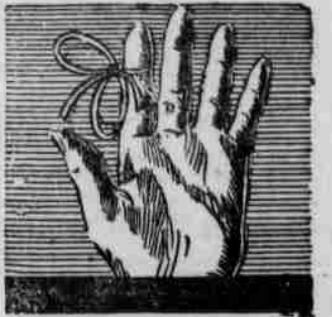
Children's day was well attended considering the busy season. The picnic has come and gone with about the same things picnics have. \$27 was cleared from the stands and will go on the debt on the piano.

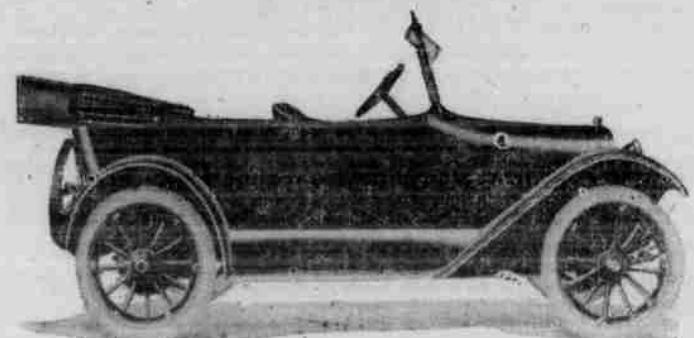
