junction with the artillery was done and many reconnoissances and the usual bombing carried out by our airplanes. Among the targets attacked were three large ammunition dumps, the docks at Bruges and numerous villages used as billets by the enemy's troops.

"In air fighting the strong west wind greatly favored the enemy in spite of the 23 hostile machines were brought down by us and six others were driven down out of control. A hostile balloon was shot down in flames. Fifteen of our machines are missing.

"After dark our night bombing machines again attacked the railways at Cortrai and Sedan and dropped over 300 bombs on rest billets. All our machines returned. One of the enemy's night flying airplanes was shot down by anti-aircraft gun fire behind our lines. "On the night of July 25-26, successful attacks were carried out on the station and factory at Pforzheim, the factory at Baalon and the station at Offenburg. Two fires broke out at Offenburg. Four hostile airplanes were bombed and attacked with machine guns and hangars were hit. Trains, anti-aircraft batteries, searchlights and other ground targets were fired upon with machine guns."

This is the first intimation that Paris was bombarded from a position so far south. The main bombardment, it is known came from guns located in the forest of St. Gobain, about 25 miles north of Breecy. At the time of the first long range bombardment of Paris, the Germans had not yet advanced to Breecy.

### Haig Reports Raids

London July 27.—Successful raids and artillery activity in various sectors of the Picardy and Flanders fronts were reported by Field Marshal Haig today.

"During the night our raiding parties entered the enemy's lines in the neighborhood of Sully-Laurette, Arleux-Engohelle and Lens and brought back several prisoners," the statement said.

Hostile artillery was active last night between the Somme and the Ancre rivers.

### French Report Advance

Paris July 27.—(Night)—Further advances north of the Marne and in the Champagne were reported by the French war office today.

"On the right bank of the Marne, the French advanced their lines north of Port-A-Binson," the communique said.

"In the Champagne, a local operation south of Mont-Hansson enable the French to realize an advance of one kilometer (five eighths of a mile) on a front

gun fire preventing the allies from crossing. Gradually the French and Americans established bridgeheads on the north bank until the Germans dominated the river crossings only from Vincelles (a mile east of Verneuil) to Oeuilly. The above despatch indicated the allies are now shoving the boches back from the north bank on the remaining sector. The main high roads south of Fismes runs straight south to Coulgonnes, eight miles north of the Marne. There it divides and sub-divides, reaching the river at various points between Chantilly and Trelois.

### LOCATION OF BIG GUN.

**George Viereck Under Grave Charges Now**  
New York, July 27.—George Viereck, former publisher of the German newspaper 'The Fatherland' and others connected with German propaganda before America entered the war, have maintained communication with Germany since the war began, according to a statement made here today by Alfred L. Becker, deputy attorney general in New York. He also charged that Viereck had been selling and distributing German books which could be classed as propaganda since the United States entered the war.

**DEMOCRATS HOLD PRIMARY**
