General Pershing's Official Report



Washington, Aug. 2.—General Pershing's casualty list today, one of the largest thus far reported, totalled 238, including:

Killed in action 42; died of wounds 48; wounded severely 126; dead of disease 7; died of accident and other causes 7; missing in action 6; wounded degree undetermined, 2.

The list was featured by the heavy losses noted from Pottsville, Pa.

Paris, Aug. 2.—(Noon).—Further allied progress in the Soissons-Rheims salient during the night was announced by the French war office today:

"North of the Marne the French progressed during the night," the communique said.

With The Italian Armies, Aug. 2.—King Victor Emmanuel today viewed motion pictures taken on various fronts and received a personal message from King George. Three British motor lorries have arrived here to show the Italian armies what British transport service is doing on other fronts.

DON'T FOOL WITH THESE



Have you been fooled by the potato pen myth? Widespread attention has been attracted by the statement that as high as 42,000 bushels of potatoes per acre may be grown by planting them in crater or pens, as shown in the picture. The plan has been tried by many individuals with discouraging results. No less authority than the Potato Magazine declares that the pens tried at the Arlington, Va., farm of the United States Department of Agriculture produced results so small as to be almost negligible. The same authority cites experiments by the Canadian Government, with a planting of 42 pounds of seed and a yield of 61 pounds four ounces of marketable potatoes. The National War Garden Commission of Washington, D. C., urges war gardeners not to waste time and money on this experiment.

**German Peace
Envoys In Holland**

London, Aug. 1.—Foreign Minister Von Kuhlmann and former Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg are rumored to have appeared in Holland, the Mail announced today.

The newspaper pointed out this may possibly mean the renewal of the German peace offensive, in connection with the new open letter of Lord Lansdowne.

The morning papers are unanimously unsympathetic with Lansdowne's attitude. The Daily Mail, anti-government, does not comment, but the Northcliffe press severely denounces the letter.

"Lansdowne's new epistle will do nothing but mischief," the News said. "When Lansdowne has persuaded the Kaiser and Hindenburg to return to Germany and pay for the damage they have done, then peace can be talked about. The allies and the British stand firmly by Wilson, saying 'the agony must not be gone through again.'"

The other newspaper comment included:

Sketch—"He ought to have addressed his letter to the Kaiser."

Express—"Lansdowne declares the present is an opportune moment to negotiate peace. He is mistaken. It is opportune to negotiate with the sword."

Graphic—"For the present, his utterances will lead to nothing."

Chronicle—"He wants us to state bed-rock terms. We doubt that Lansdowne, if buying a house, would tell the absolute top price he would give."

LATEST MAP OF BIG ALLIED ARMY OFFENSIVE



WHERE THE ALLIES ARE HEMMING IN CLOSER—The allies have advanced in the direction of arrow (1), capturing Villemonroire, and at arrow (2) captured the railroad center of Oulchy-le-Chateau. Assaults at arrow (3) captured Reuil and Savargues farm. Americans probably were engaged here.

A German counter attack west of Rheims, in the direction of arrow (4) retook Mery-Premezy, won by the Franco-British forces the previous day.

The solid line represents the present fighting zone, the dash line the front at the beginning of the allied counter drive.
