HATCH HOME PLACE FOR OLD PEOPLE

Mrs. Geo. E. Hatch's Will Is Filed For Probate With County Clerk Today

The Old People's Home of Salem, 12th and Perry streets has been given the old Hatch home at 636 North Front street, according to the will filed today in the office of county clerk of Mrs. George E. Hatch, who died June 30, 1918.

In her will she appointed J. S. Kummer executor and directed that the assessments against the property be paid off. The property has been in the Hatch family since 1863, the only transfers being from P. H. Hatch to his son George E. Hatch and from him to his wife, Mrs. Lizzie M. Hatch.

In disposing of property in her will, amounting to about \$6,000, Mrs. Hatch in a number of smaller bequests remembered many of her friends. To her brother J. S. Kummer, she gave \$1000 from which he was instructed to pay funeral expenses and the assessments against the home.

To her sister, Martha Kummer, of Koonau, Ind., she gave a \$1400 note and mortgage. To her brother B. T. Kummer, \$1,000 which he had borrowed of her. A sister living at New Castle, Indiana, was remembered with one sheet, two pillow cases and one dollie trimmed with daisies. A wall clock, a blue and white quilt, a piano and a \$100 Liberty bond were given to several relatives.

To Katherina Kummer, of Gervais, was willed by Mrs. Hatch, a wrist watch. To Mrs. Mollie Horon, of Salem, a cupboard. To Mrs. D. A. White, one sheet and two pillow cases and to Abbie Farrar, of Salem, an old red trunk and mahogany dresser.

Private O'Rourke Wears Three Military Medals

For the first time, the people of Salem will have the chance to see a man from the English army wearing three of the most coveted military medals awarded by the British government. This will be next Monday evening when Private O'Rourke appears on the platform of the armory to deliver his lecture telling of his experience in northern France fighting the Huns.

Many a soldier takes his life in hand doing brave deeds, and is given the Victoria Cross. Others show distinguished bravery and are awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal. The other coveted medal is the Military Medal but it falls to the lot of but few men to be awarded all three of the awards.

In his talk Monday evening Private O'Rourke will tell of some of his deeds that entitles him to wear the three highest military awards. In the entire English army, barely 500 awards have been made of the Victoria Cross and but half of the men are alive today.

He was wounded three times, but O'Rourke says but little about this story is the biggest war story that has ever reached Salem and it is only through his furlough of 60 days that he is able to bring the true tale direct to the people of Salem.

Motor Vehicle License Fees Are Growing

The tidy sum of \$439,480.50 has been collected in fees by the motor vehicle registration department of Secretary of State Elliott's office from January 1 to July 31 of this year. The amount collected during the entire period of 1917 was \$196,787.50.

The number of automobiles registered this year is 58,775, while in 1917 the number totaled 48,632. This year there are 3,218 motorcycles registered, as against 3,400 last year. Licenses have been issued to 2,580 chauffeurs, as against 3,477 last year.

During the month of July the department collected \$14,547 in fees. A total of 1,519 new automobiles were registered and 190 cars were reregistered. Beginning the first of August the fees for registration are cut in half for the rest of the year.

Court House News

In the circuit court the Thos. Kay Woolen Mills Co. filed notice of an appeal to the Supreme court. This is the last move in the contempt proceedings against Thos. Kay, president and E. J. Swafford, secretary of the Thos. Kay Woolen Mills, in which they were ordered by Judge Bingham to be imprisoned until they complied with certain orders of the court relative to the transfer of the Woolen Mill Co.'s stock.

W. H. Norris, as receiver for the Fannie E. Hubbard properties filed his reports of moneys received and disbursed up to July 6, 1918 and asks his discharge as receiver as the Alliance Trust Co. which bought in the property, took possession at that date.

Eastern Siberian Free Of Bolshevik Faction

Stockholm, Aug. 3.—Western Siberia, it was declared here today, has been entirely cleared of bolsheviks.

Pershing Appears With His Army In Big U. S. War Film

A great demand for seats at the box office of the Liberty theater indicates that the United States official war films "Pershing's Crusaders," will meet with the same success here that it has achieved in other cities. Capacity business and a wide popular interest have marked these engagements. Owing to the national interest in everything shown in these pictures, it might well be expected that every one will want to see them.

Gen. Pershing and the American soldiers at the front form an important part of the films. The engagement is for three days beginning Thursday, Aug. 8.

LABOR DAY ENDS BIG LEAGUE BALL

World Series Will Follow Immediately After That Date Is Decision

Cleveland, O., Aug. 3.—Big league baseball will continue until Labor day, September 2 with a world series immediately after that date.

This decision was reached here today when the American league magnates met with Barney Dreyfuss of the Pittsburgh Pirates and Garry Herrmann of the Cincinnati Reds, who represented the National league and the National baseball commission.

The decision lays on the shelf the plan of Ban Johnson, president of the American league, who had urged that the big leagues finish their schedule August 13 or 20 so that the world series could be played before the September 1 time limit set for professional baseball by Secretary of War Baker, the magnates further decided that the present schedules will be played just as they are, without any revamping in the date between now and Labor day.
