PRESIDENT WITNESS OF FIRST LAUNCHING

Hundred Thousand People Cheer When Mrs. Wilson Christens Vessel

Philadelphia, Aug. 5.—The freighter Quistnock, the first vessel to be launched at Hog Island, left the ways at 12:56 o'clock this afternoon.

President and Mrs. Wilson witnessed the launching. Mrs. Wilson christened the ship while one hundred thousand persons cheered.

A deafening cheer went up as the huge hull started to move six minutes after the presidential party had arrived from Washington.

A single blast from a nearby whistle; a shout from a voice on the ship—was the signal that started the 7500 ton cargo carrier down the ways on its plunge into the water.

A second later the wicker covered but crashed against the ship's bow and a foaming spray of champagne lapped into the air.

"Christen thee 'Quistnock!'" said Mrs. Wilson as the hull glided away.

Allies Have Decided To Intervene In Russia

Tokio, Aug. 5.—Official announcement was made today that the allies have determined to intervene in Siberia. Allied expeditions, however, will not interfere with internal affairs and will safeguard territorial integrity, said the announcement.

At the same time, it was learned authoritatively that a ministerial crisis was avoided as the result of a diplomatic council held August 1 in connection with Japan's reply to "a certain power" regarding the Siberian question.

Court House Notes

In the case of J. F. Morris against the Gates Mill Co. and others, before the Circuit court, the defendants filed an answer praying for a decree that all moneys collected by the receiver be distributed among the partners according to a decree of the court. In the case of Jessie M. Moe against Clarence A. Porter and others the court appointed F. E. Callister, Chas. H. King and B. B. Herrick to set apart by metes and bounds the dower interest of Mrs. Moe.

The court granted Ellsworth H. Riches a divorce from Nina Riches. They were married in 1915 in California and have one child 15 months old living with the mother at Medford. The complaint states that she deserted her home May 13, 1917 at Woodburn. The court decreed that while the father of the child was in the army, he should pay \$15 a month for the care and support of the child and \$10 a month until the child is six years old. Then upon application, the court would consider an application for an increased amount to support the child. He is to have the privilege of visiting the child.

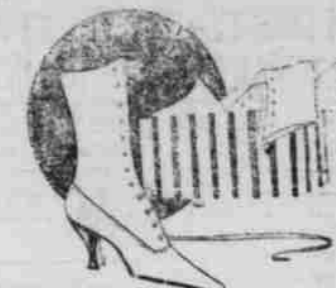
