solution," of the problem.
In answer to the president's inquiry, the commission says its investigation of the packers shows unquestionably that there exists "monopolies, control, trusts combinations, conspiracies and restraint of trade out of harmony with the law and public interest."

An Intricate Machine.
While its findings disclose an "intricate fabric" of such combinations and intricacies, the legislative and administrative remedies, it believes, can easily be arrived at through the railroad administration.

In a vigorous attack upon the "trust" the commission says "not only is the business of gathering, preparing and selling meat products in their control, but an almost countless number of by-products industries are similarly dominated and, not content with reporting out of mastery as to commodities which constitute meat and its by-products, they have invaded allied industries and even unrelated ones."
"The commission," the commission's report continued, "has not stopped at the most minute integration, but has gone on into a state of conglomeration so that unrelated heterogeneous enterprises are brought under their control."
"We have found that it is not so much the means of production and preparation or the sheer momentum of great wealth, but the advantage which is obtained through a monopolistic control of the market places and means of transportation and distribution."
"If these five great concerns owned no packing plants and killed no cattle and still retained control of the instruments of transportation, of marketing and of storage, their position would not be less strong than it is."

At Mercy of "Big Five."
"The producer of livestock is at the mercy of the five companies because they control the market and the marketing facilities and to some extent the rolling stock which transports the produce to the markets."

"The competitors of these five concerns are at their mercy because of the control of the marketing places, storage facilities and refrigerator cars for distribution."
"The consumer of meat products is at the mercy of these five concerns: both producer and competitor are helpless to bring relief."

"Out of the mass of information in our hands, one fact stands out with all possible emphasis. The small dominant group of American meat packers are now international in their activities, while remaining American in identity."

ceed in controlling it for any considerable distance, Rupprecht and young Hindenzollern will have their areas of contact very dangerously shortened, necessitating a considerable detour for troops to move from one sector to the other.

At the same time, a sharp pocket will be made of the German crown prince's front between Amiens and Montdidier, which will threaten Von Hindenburg with the possibility of a duplication of the Marne disaster. Should Marshal Haig drive back the Germans to the accomplishment of these immediate objectives, he will have drawn Amiens beyond danger of a new enemy offensive and will have rescued the important Amiens-Paris railway from the menace of the German artillery.

to get from his brother before he died. He placed him in the automobile and took him to a neighbors, where he expired while parties were telephoning for a physician. Coroner R. L. Chapman and Sheriff Orr were notified of the shooting and left immediately for the scene of the killing. Sheriff Orr found the weapon with which the other Crane is supposed to have shot the other lying beneath the man and his hand was gripped in such a way as to indicate that he held the revolver. Some thought was at first given to the possibility that more than one gun was used in the affray but after hearing evidence given by neighbors and the testimony of (Land Crane the coroner's jury rendered a verdict that the shooting was committed by the father, William Crane. Mrs. Claud Crane was killed by a bullet through the heart which passed entirely through her body, another bullet wound appears just beneath the left breast the bullet itself having probably struck a bone and remaining in the body. The murderer himself ended his life by sending a bullet through his brain. The bodies were brought to this city by Coroner Chapman and prepared for burial. The bodies of the father and son will be buried in the local I. O. O. F. cemetery while that of Mrs. Claud Crane will be sent to her former home in Idaho for interment.

Narrowly Escaped

Going Over Niagara

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Aug. 7.—Henry James Harris, 40, and Gus Lofberg, 54, employees of the Great Lakes Dredging and Dock company, were rescued this morning from a scow on which they were marooned, 3000 feet above the Horseshoe falls, and 850 feet from the Canadian shore. The scow lodged on a shelf of rock in the rapids above the cataract at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon after a tow line between it and its tug broke while the vessels were a short distance above the upper rapids. Harris was the first taken off. He was landed on the roof of the Electrical Development company at 8:40 o'clock.

Lofberg was landed an hour later. The men made the trip from the stranded scow in a breeches buoy operating on lines shot across the scow by the United States coast guard from Fort Niagara.

Both men collapsed after they were brought ashore.
