NORTHERN DISTRICT ON RUSSIA PLEASED WITH ALLIED HELP

Proclamation Issued By Revolutionary Faction At Archangel

Washington, Aug. 12.—The new government of the northern district of Russia welcomes allied intervention in Siberia and counts on the aid of America, Britain, France and the other allies to defend the northern region and render economic and financial aid. This information was contained in a proclamation issued under date of August 9 by the revolutionary government at Archangel, received by the state department today. The proclamation stated that "it is convinced that Russia's and the allies' interests in the struggle against the foreign enemy are one and the same. It is known that the allied troops come not to interfere with internal affairs and their arrival is not against the desires of the local population. Therefore, the supreme government greets the allied forces entering the north to wage a contest against the common enemy and summons the entire population to greet them gladly and assist by every possible means."

The proclamation, which was issued directly to the citizens of the province and city of Archangel, declared the bolshevik power has fallen because the populace did not support bolshevik views. The people rejected them for their betrayal of Russia at Brest-Litovsk for civil war, because of the universal famine, the destruction of liberty and rights, legalized robbery and shooting squads, and for their ruin of the country's economic and industrial life, the proclamation said. Because of this, it was added, the peoples representatives were forced to take into their hands the government of the northern region "because as yet there is no legal all-Russian government."

The government, it announces, had undertaken the following tasks: Re-establishment of a single all-Russian government and of local self-government. Defense of the North and of the entire nation "against insolent onslaughts against Russian territory, independence and inhabitants made by Germany, Finland and other enemy countries."

Re-union to Russia of lost territory in accordance with the desires of inhabitants. Re-establishment of a firm administration of justice. Guarantees to labor classes that they will obtain land they are entitled to and defense of the rights of labor of Russia as a whole. Overcoming the existing famine. The proclamation states that the new government "relies for support on all classes which treasure the above objects. In particular, it expects to defend the north with the friendly assistance to Russia of governments and peoples of America, England, France and others. It also counts on allied assistance against starvation and financial difficulties."

The proclamation is signed by several members of the constituent assembly from the northern region and by the assistant mayor of the city of Vologda and the vice-president of the Archangel city duma, forming the supreme government of the northern territory.

GERMANS FIGHT HARD

vance on an eighteen mile front between the Avre and the Oise, while the situation between Roye and the Somme has become more stabilized, owing to the increased enemy resistance.

The British have taken Lihons. They previously were reported to have captured the city, but evidently were driven out in the German counter attack there.

Reports that Chaulnes and Roye have been captured are incorrect.

In Four Miles of Roye

London, Aug. 12.—British troops, continuing their advance, have progressed to within less than four miles of Roye, capturing Armacourt and Tilloy, the British war office announced today.

Additional progress was made astride the Somme, when the lines were joined east of Mericourt and Etinehem. New counter attacks in the center south of Lihons were repulsed.

"Yesterday evening the enemy again attacked our positions south of Lihons, but was repulsed," the statement said.

"As the result of a successful operation we carried out immediately south of the Somme, we captured over 200 prisoners and linked up our positions east of Mericourt with the line east of

Etinehem on the north bank of the river

"On the right of the fourth British army the allies progressed yesterday in the direction of Roye, capturing the villages of Armacourt and Tilloy."

"In the northern portion of the British front we effected local improvements east of Robecq and between Vieux-Berquin and Merris (all in Flanders.)"

SITUATION UNCHANGED.
Paris, Aug. 12.—(Noon)—The French war office today reported that the situation between the Avre and the Oise is unchanged.

"Between the Avre and the Oise there is no change," the communique said.

"During the night the Marquillies and Grivillers regions (six miles east of Montdidier) were bombarded."

RESIST DESPERATELY.

With the British Armies in France, Aug. 12.—(2:45 a. m.)—Von De Marwitz and Von Hutier are trying desperately to stiffen the resistance of their armies, whose backs are now almost tight against the Somme.

The allies are advancing slowly but steadily, their guns commanding not only Roye, Chaulnes, Nesle and Peronne but the Somme crossings everywhere.
