BRAZILIAN MOTORSHIP SUNK CLOSE TO COAST

Captain And Crew Received U-Boat Believed To Have Been Sunk.

An Atlantic Port, Aug. 16.—The captain and 22 members of the crew of the Brazilian motorship Madrugada, which was sunk by a German submarine about 700 yards off Winter Quarter shoals, Va., were brought into port here today. They were picked up by the steamer Taunton of the Atlantic Fruit line at noon yesterday.

Captain Frederick House of the Madrugada said his vessel left New York on Wednesday with a miscellaneous cargo bound for Santos, Brazil.

The submarine started shelling the Madrugada from a distance of 200 yards. Most of the shells struck below the water line. At the first shot the crew of the Madrugada took to the lifeboats. The vessel sank within an hour. Captain House declared the U-boat was not one of the latest type of submarine craft. He said it was about 250 feet long, carried one five inch gun forward and had only one periscope.

After the Madrugada sank the submarine left in a northerly direction.

Schooner Sybe Safe.

Washington, Aug. 16.—The schooner submarine, has arrived safely at Gloucester, Mass., previously reported sunk by a U-boat. The navy department was informed today. Details of attacks on other ships were:

The remainder of the crew of the schooner Progress has been reported rescued.

David Evans, master of the Penitence, was taken prisoner by the U-boat, survivors of that vessel reported.

Hoyle, fourth engineer of the Penitence, was killed by the explosion of the torpedo.

Think U-Boat Sunk.

Washington, Aug. 16.—Naval officials on the scene of the sinking of the Dorothy Barrett by a submarine believe they destroyed the U-boat, although the navy department is without complete proof. Secretary Daniels said today. The sea in that vicinity is being dragged and an attempt is being made to find the submarine which is believed to have gone to the bottom, wrecked by depth bombs.
