#### Died

**BAKER**—At his home in Salem, Aug. 15, 1918, Lewis M. Baker, at the age of 81 years.

Besides his wife he is survived by five children: Chester C. Baker, Frank A. Baker, and Mrs. Ella M. Baker, all of Salem, and Fred O. Baker and Edward D. Baker, of Spokane.

The funeral services will be held Saturday morning at 10 o'clock from the chapel of Webb & Clough and will be attended by members of Sedgewick Post, Grand Army of the Republic. Burial will be in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

Mr. Baker was born in Virginia Feb. 15, 1837, and was a veteran of the Civil war, having enlisted in Company B, Second regiment Wisconsin infantry at the beginning of the war. He was in the battle of Gettysburg where he was severely wounded and from which he never fully recovered.
