1474th Day of the War; 32nd Day of Counter Offensive

Dis-Aisne front - The French attacked on the front of nearly ten miles between Carlepoint and Pontenoy yesterday evening, advancing a mile and a quarter and linking up the Picardy and Soissons-Rheims fronts.

Vesle-Aisne Front - Comparative quiet continued yesterday.

Flanders Front - The British made another advance in the Merville sector and last night repulsed a German attack against the newly won position between Ostunne and Meteren.

French-Alsace Front - Americans advanced against east of St. Die yesterday and improved their positions in the village of Franche, which they captured Saturday.

German Alsace Front - A raid west of Gebweiler was broken up by the American artillery and rifle fire yesterday.

Woevre Front - Lively patrolling by both Americans and Germans continued yesterday.

Italian Front - Archduke Joseph has succeeded Field Marshal Von Hoetzendorf in command of the fountain group of the Austrian armies.

Russia - With the approval of the bolsheviks, German troops have occupied the important cities of Smolensk and Vitebsk in western Russia.

Washington, Aug. 19. - Spain is nearer the brink of war today. Diplomats are pointing to the recent Spanish note announcing that German ships interned in Spanish ports will be seized as compensation for U. boat sinkings.

Paris, Aug. 19. - According to official report of the French Sixth army, operating north of the Marne an American division composed almost entirely of German born men, advanced eleven miles in seven days during the counter offensive.
