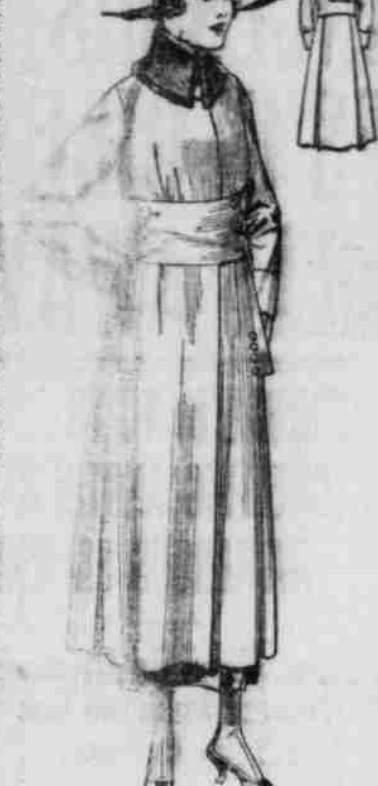

Blue Blood Easily Acquired in Russia

London, July 23.—(By Mail).—Apparently it is very easy to acquire "blue blood" in Russia. The Minskoye Slovo published the following letter written by a "squad companion" elected by his comrades to command a bolshevik regiment, to his wife:

"My greatly respected wife, Agripina Ivanovna:

"In the first lines of my letter I inform you that by the grace of God and the will of my soldier comrades, the blood of nobility is now flowing in my veins, because I am now father commander of the whole regiment and of its war chest.

"I enclose 100 roubles with which you must buy yourself an astrachan coat and a feather which is worn on the head.

"You are not to keep company with the women of the village, but you must call on the officers' wives. Do not rush into their homes like swine

but let yourself be announced to let them know who you are.

"Do not carry on with the soldiers and so strain my regimental rank. When I return, if I hear anything about you, I will disembowel you.

"Your husband and at present, "Commander of a regiment, (Signed) "Thoma Terentyevich Kislo-Oukhim."

"The greatly respected wife" was so proud of her husband's leap into the ranks of the nobility that she sent the whole episode to the newspapers irrespective of the suspicions he evinced concerning her own behavior.

Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 21.—Putting its fare issue up to the United States court, the Columbus Railway Power and Light company today announced forfeiture of its franchise and started to charge five cent fares with one cent for transfers. The rate has been eight tickets for a quarter and no charge for transfers.

French Drive Ahead

French troops also advanced west of Lassigny in sharp fighting.

"Between the Oise and the Aisne in the situation last night, the enemy failed to react," the communique said. "The French continued to progress on the whole front and captured Carlepont and Cuts."

"West of Lassigny, in the sharpest fighting, the French progressed."

"In the Champagne, German raids were repulsed."

The surgical dressing department of the Red Cross, with rooms in the post office building is once again calling for help in this most important branch of Red Cross work.

During the past summer months, although efforts have been made to interest patriotic women in this most important hospital work, out of all the women in Salem who could volunteer their services for a few hours work during the day, only a dozen or more have shown the proper spirit and have been devoting part of their time to this preparation of spangnum moss pads, now such an important matter and so necessary for hospital work.

Albert Sweetser, an official who is interested in the preparation of spangnum moss visited headquarters yesterday and was greatly surprised to find that barely a dozen women in the city were patriotic enough to give some of their time to hospital work. In Eugene, he said the surgical dressing workers numbered every day from 150 to 250.

He could not understand why a city the size of Salem and also the capital of the state could muster only 12 or 15 patriotic women workers daily.

The class of business girls has been doing good work and meeting regularly, but the great call is for day workers in order that the department may meet the demand for spangnum dressings. It is understood that Canada is now out of the moss and it is up to you northwest to supply the hospitals.

Every woman in the city has at least a relative or special friend in the army and yet with this condition, it seems the women in the city are unwilling to give time to this hospital work just as the Americans are getting into the firing line and there are daily reports of the hundreds of wounded, needing hospital attention.

There is a call for volunteers in this work and it now seems to be a question as to whether in the city of Salem there are not more than a dozen women who are patriotic enough to help in this very essential Red Cross work.

SURGICAL DRESSING DEPARTMENT CALLS FOR MORE HELPERS

The Question Is, Has Salem Only a Small Number of Patriotic Women.

Was Seized By German Submarine Yesterday.—Has Sunk Three Schooners.

A Canadian Port, Aug. 21.—The steam trawler Triumph reported seized by a German submarine yesterday, has been armed with guns and manned by a German crew of 16 and is raiding fishing vessels on the north Atlantic fishing banks, according to survivors reaching here today.

Three schooners are already said to have been destroyed by the new raider.

News of the destroyed schooners, which were sunk with bombs, has reached shore.

By using the Triumph, the Germans were able to approach the unsuspecting fishing vessels without arousing suspicion.

In an interview today, the captain of the captured Triumph stated that the commander of the U-boat which had captured his schooner had told them that there were six U-boats now operating off the Atlantic coast and that they intended wiping out the fishing fleets along the coast.

on from the Ois almost to Soissons over an irregular line nearly 25 miles long.

The Germans are rushing up reinforcements in motor trucks and are concentrating their resistance in Carlepont and Ourscamp forests (bordering the east bank of the Oise from Bailly northward to Sempiigny).

The French, however, are making good progress just east of these wooded areas beyond Nampont, where the most furious fighting is going on.

Mangin is now in possession of a score of villages and many scores of strong points. He is holding the entire Carlepont-Cuts road (Cuts is four and a half miles southeast of Noyon), the Bois-De-Lamontagne, hills 139 and 140, Bellefontaine and Nes. He is believed to have taken Hill 150 and reached the table land north of Vassens, occupying Vassens (two miles and a half southwest of Soissons), Epigny (six miles northwest of Soissons), Valprix farm, and all lines southward to Pommieres (two miles west of Soissons).

The number of prisoners which was reported more than two thousand yesterday, is steadily increasing.

Ludendorff is reported have wired urgent orders to Berlin for training the class of 1920. Preparation of these youths of 18 must be finished in ten or twelve weeks. Such an order means one of two things:

Either the Germans are still planning for a tremendous, desperate drive this autumn, or the man power crisis is even more serious than appearances

ARGENTINE'S CONTRIBUTION

Washington, Aug. 21.—A consignment of \$185,000 in gold reached American Red Cross headquarters here today from Buenos Aires as Argentina's contribution to the Red Cross drive.

It was also announced that Chile was sending \$124,000.

Word has just arrived of a combined Argentina-Brazilian Red Cross drive at Pernambuco, the proceeds of \$8800 being divided between the two allied societies.

WARDMAN BEATEN.

Jackson, Miss., Aug. 21.—In complete returns early today indicate the defeat of United States Senator Wardman at yesterday's primaries. The vote in fifty two out of eighty two counties show Congressman Harrison leading Wardman by more than ten thousand votes for the senatorial nomination. Scattering returns from the remaining thirty counties indicate that Congressman Harrison will continue to gain it is predicted that the final count will show a majority of from 15,000 to 20,000 votes for the congressman.
