COMMERCIAL CLUB IS DECLARED NECESSARY TO CITY'S WELFARE

At Meeting Last Night Sept-ment Unanimous For Maintaining Club.

At a meeting held at the Commercial club last evening, the general opinion of the representative business men of the city was that under no circumstances should there be even the thought of Salem, the capital city of the state, going before the northwest as unable to support a Commercial club. Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner expressed the unanimous opinion of all. He said: "I cannot imagine how any prosperous town can get along without a Commercial club. It is one of the most important features of the city. It has been well said that the Commercial club is the forum of the city, but that depends on the club. We have got to have some sort of a center club for the city and this community would wake up to find that it had made a sad mistake if the doors of the Commercial club were closed."

W. M. Hamilton spoke referring to the necessity for the club as a center for the activities of the city and the government's work. Hal D. Patton was most optimistic as to the future of the club but he could not understand why so many professional men and state politicians as well did not take an active interest in it along with the business men.

George C. Will was surprised to hear that some of the business men were not sending in their subscriptions. He felt the club was so necessary that he could not even imagine any business man not supporting it with at least one membership.

E. T. Barnes was in favor of a short and quick campaign and was most willing to do his share of the work besides taking out several memberships. C. M. Roberts said he felt he was like a good many business men, that while he had signed his membership card, had neglected to send it in. He said he liked the idea of once a member, always a member.

P. W. Steusloff said it would require about \$5000 to finance the club for the coming year and this would require a membership of 400. The feeling in general was that the business and professional men would rally to the support of the club and that the solicitors next Monday and Tuesday morning should have no difficulty in securing the required membership. The captains are W. M. Hamilton, John H. Scott, U. G. Shipley, Theodore Roth and Wm. Gahlsdorf.

Governor Whytcomb announced today that he will appoint General Charles F. Beebe of Portland as acting general to succeed Colonel John M. Williams, who will submit his resignation within a day or two to accept a commission as a major in the regular army.

Colonel Williams has been acting adjutant general for about a year, as he was appointed to fill the vacancy when Adjutant General George A. White was commissioned in the regular army.

The public service commission received information today that a supplemental hearing on diversion and re-assignment rules on fresh fruits and vegetables will be held in Portland September 23 by Interstate Commerce Commissioner C. B. Altshousen. The original hearing will be held in Chicago on September 4.

Salmon Prices Will Go Higher

Portland, Or., Aug. 24.—One article will not increase in price to the consumer this year—it is salmon. The food administration has fixed exactly the same price for the Alaska pack of canned salmon as that which prevailed in 1917, it was announced. The Alaska pack dominates the salmon business. However, the consumer may not be able to buy any salmon, for the government has requisitioned 100 per cent of reds, medium reds and pinks, to be held for possible government requirements.
