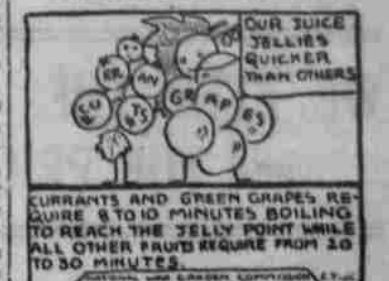

One of the happiest of the prisoners, judging from the expression on his face, was a German messenger dog who was confined in one of the cages, although he apparently only reflected the feelings of the young Germans a-bout him and responded to advances no more willingly than did the men.

Alsatian prisoners said the Germans are scattering their in groups of ten throughout the army. They said punishment for desertion was visited on their families. In some cases, their sisters had been sent to work in the front lines, they said. This is responsible for the stories that the Germans are using women to fight in the battle lines.

Among the sulking Prussian officers was one who was still aggravated because a tank to which he sought to surrender lacked room to take him aboard and he had to walk back to the concentration camp. The total of prisoners taken by the British since Wednesday is now believed to be more than 40,000.
