Many people have misunderstood the purpose of the National League for Women's service, and have that that it interfered with the work of the Red Cross. But this not true for in every way it co-operates with the Red Cross and other patriotic organizations.

According to the official pamphlet of the organization the object of this league is "To co-ordinate and standardize the work of women of America along lines of constructive patriotism; to develop the resources, and to promote the efficiency of women in meeting their every day responsibility to Home, to State, to Nation and to Humanity; to provide organized, trained groups in every community prepared to co-operate with the Red Cross and other agencies in dealing with any calamity—fire, flood, famine, economic disorder, etc., and in time of war to supplement the work of the Red Cross, the army and navy, and to deal with questions of "Woman's work and woman's welfare." The slogan of the organization is "For God, For Country, For Home."

Although the organization has just recently been started one of the plans accomplished has been the canning of seven hundred quarts of fruits and jellies for use in the hospitals at nearby forts.

Tomorrow many prominent maids and matrons will be on the streets and in the stores for the purpose of selling tags to raise money for shipping the fruit to the hospitals. The local organization also hopes to raise enough to maintain one of the hospital wards. Tomorrow there will be a meeting at two o'clock in the Commercial club parlors to perfect the organization of the National League and to plan the work for the fall and winter. It is hoped that women representing all the various women's clubs and Red Cross auxiliaries will be present.

south of Peronne were taken and important progress was made on the high ground beyond Peronne and Harlu. Following is Haig's report: "Yesterday to the southward of Peronne we forced crossings of the Somme despite resistance from enemy rear guard on the eastern bank. We captured St. Christ, Le Mesnil, Brie and Bruntill villages and took a number of prisoners.

"Astride the Amiens-St. Quentin road we reached Athies and Mons-en-Chaussée.

"Eastward of Peronne we have taken Doult. We made important progress on the high ground between Peronne and Harlu."

Eastward of Neuve Chapelle, the statement said, the British established themselves in portions of the old German front line.

"We hold Bussu (northeast of Peronne) and are nearing Templeux La Posse, Nurlu and Equancourt, where there was sharp fighting yesterday and last night.

"On the left front west of La Bassée we gained ground and beat off a counter attack. As a result we continued our progress.

"Yesterday and last night we established ourselves in portions of the old German front line east of Neuve-Chapelle. The old British line in the Fausquait sector is again in our possession.

"Northeast of Armentieres we advanced our line capturing several prisoners."

French Official Report.

Pais, Sept. 6.—A continuous advance on the whole front between the Somme and the Vesle was announced today by the French war office. Forward thrusts were reported from Epenancourt, south of Peronne to Glennes, northeast of Fismes.

(The distance between Epenancourt and Glennes in an air line is fifty miles, but the turns and twists of the line make the battle front much longer than that.)

American troops have taken Glennes and are approaching the Aisne at new places, northeast of Fismes, the statement showed. In their advance on Ham the French have taken Plessis Patte D'Oise, slightly more than four miles south of it. Toward Chantay the French have passed through Abbeourt (three miles southwest).

"During the night we continued to advance on the whole front between the Somme and the Vesle," the statement declared.

"We continued to cross the Somme in the region of Epenancourt (south of Peronne and five miles east of Chantay).

"Further south we pushed forward at several points until we reached the Ham-Peronne road south of Ham. We occupied Plessis Patte D'Oise and Berlancourt.

"We have passed out of Guivry, Caillouet, Crepiy and Abbeourt. (These points are west and southwest of Chantay).

"North of the Allette we reached the table land north of Danricourt and the borders of Sinceny.

President Requests Information Upon New York Draft Raid

Washington, Sept. 5.—President Wilson late today asked Attorney General Gregory for the facts in the wholesale slacker raids in New York. It is understood the president is deeply interested. Bruce Bielnski, chief of the department of justice, today said the raids were authorized by the department of justice, which was working in co-operation with the provost marshal's office.

Johnson Defends Slackers.

Washington, Sept. 5.—Charging that the government is trying to terrorize the American people, Senator Johnson, California, today scathingly denounced the recent raids in New York when many thousands of men were arrested. Johnson's bitter speech followed criticism of the raid by Senators Lamberth, the late, Calder and Gore. All declared it an outrage totally out of harmony with American ideas and likely to do more harm than good.

"The law of suspects, the law of the French revolution has come into our lives," said Johnson, reading an account of the raid from a New York newspaper.

"Unless I told you where this thing occurred you would never believe it was in the United States. You'd say it never could happen in free America—in terrorized Prussia it might. What's the reason for it?"

"Terrorism—the terrorism that prevents and American newspaper from saying what it thinks, that keeps loyal citizens from voicing their honest views on postum or in public."

President Gompers To English Workmen

Derby, England, Sept. 6.—American labor is as united as labor anywhere in the world, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor told the labor congress here. There is complete agreement between the American government and American labor, he declared. "America says to her allies we're coming 5,000,000; but why halt at 5,000,000?" Gompers said, amid prolonged and loud cheering.

"We have not always agreed with the government of Great Britain," Gompers asserted. "We sympathized with the Boers, and today we sympathize with Ireland, but we rejoice that the old Britain is not like the Britain of today."

"How anyone can now entertain the old ideas of international peace is beyond my ken. Labor is in the war, not because of a love of war. We won't prolong the war a minute longer than necessary, but we are unwilling to shorten by an hour if that means that the military machine can continue in existence."

heavy foliage and no matted vines, and the hope are easy to handle.

The picking in the two counties is general now and by next Monday it is expected that work will be under headway in every yard. The price this year is 50 cents a box, or \$1 a hundred when the work is being done by the hundred. On this basis, pickers are averaging from \$2.50 to \$3 a day.

The crop will average heavier than last year, but this is of but little comfort to the hop men as there is practically no market. According to the bill that is now before Congress, no more beer is to be manufactured after May 1, 1919 and this has had a most depressing effect on the market. Hop men are simply waiting to see what will happen next.
