War Summary of United Press

1495th Day of the War; 51st Day of Counter Offensive

Pleasant front—British and French are advancing against St. Quentin on a sixteen mile front north and south of Peronne, gaining four miles. Further south, Ham is being encircled and the French are approaching Chauny. Allies crossed the Somme river, Somme canal and Canal Du Nord on broad fronts.

Aisne front—Americans and French now hold a line on the Aisne from a point below Misy-Sur-Aisne to Villers-en-Francis, about twelve miles. American troops are nearing the river at new places further eastward. Northeast of Soissons the French made gains in their flanking thrust against German positions above the Aisne.

Flanders front—British advance on the southern part of the salient, seiz-
