FRUITLAND ITEMS

(Capital Journal Special Service.) Fruitland, Or., Sept. 6.--The Fruitland service flag contains the following names, Nelson and Robert Crosshaw, brothers; Kenneth Bunner, Carson Standifer, Oswald Fleigel, Avisal and E. N. Branson, Jr., brothers; Wm. Bellamy; Fred Gerig; Leo Donaldson; Robert Crosshaw died at Fort Stevens more than a year ago.

Julius Miller will soon begin drying prunes at the Kuntz ranch down the river near Wheatland. J. W. Silsbee, veteran of the Civil War, going from the state of Wisconsin, and who visited relatives in Portland at Fruitland and in Bethel and friends in Salem, has returned to his home in California. He attended the late encampment at Portland. He was accompanied by Mrs. Silsbee. The next encampment will be held at Columbus, Mo. He states that every veteran receiving the age of 75 years will receive \$40 a month pension. He is 74 years old and gets \$32. The family at one time owned property in the Auburn district and removed to Auburn 25 years ago. When he got onto State street in Salem last week he was almost lost. He could not see the old wooden shacks which for so long disfigured the city. He could hardly credit his eyes when he saw the modern sky scrapers which supplanted the rookeries.

In my news last week the types made me state that General Canby was murdered by Modoc Indians in 1893. It should have been 1873. Also for "true" read "cute".
